NEW DEAL FAMILY TAX

The stark-impact of the withholding tax has taught many an American voter what it means to have a spendthrift political party in power in Washington. We are all learning that when Washington bureaucrats spend, we pay. The fallacious theory that it was being taken from folks who had too much and given to those who had too little has been shown sky high.

Take a salary of \$3,500 for example. If you earn that much, are married and have three children—a family of five—under the present tax law, passed by the New Deal, after you have paid your income tax (before the New Deal you would have been exempt from income taxes) you will have left approximately \$640 for each member of the family to live on for the year.

Your next door neighbor may earn the same amount. If he is single, he will have approximately \$2,785 for himself for the year. If he is married, with no children, he will have about \$1,500 each for himself and wife.

In other words, the man with a family is the man who is really hit by the New Deal taxation. And yet New Dealers still talk about taxing the rich. Now Secretary of the Treasury Morgenthau says the New Deal needs more money.

There are black days ahead for the family man.

"ESSENTIAL" WORKERS

At this time, when the Administration has been drafting fathers, there are 675,000 draft-age single and childless married men in civilian capacities in Government bureaus, Representative Forest A. Harness, Republican, of Indiana, estimated recently.

A subcommittee headed by Representative John M. Costello, Democrat, of California, was told that there are 1,086 single men and 1,144 married men of draft age in the Federal Security Agency alone. Secretary Ickes, it was informed, is seeking 6,000 deferments for the Interior Department.

Ralph H. Barton, counsel of the House Military Affairs Committee, said that deferments of Government workers have increased by 27,008 since May 15.

SOMETHING TO REMEMBER

No industry has worked more conscientiously or has had more detail to comply with in connections with OPA rulings, than has the nation's food industry.

OPA would be helpless in carrying out a rationing and price ceiling program without the cooperation of the stores. Therefore, it is an obligation of OPA officials to simplify rationing and price ceilings as rapidly as improvements are possible. Friendly cooperation by the three parties at interest—the government, the stores and the consumers—will secure results unobtainable by antagonistic policies.

Cakes Long Journey Related by Corporal

The story of the sad end of a cake which followed a service man half way around the world was told in a letter from Corporal W. A. Barratt, a radio communications man with the ground service of the 14th air force in China, to his parents, Mr. and Mrs. W. A. Barratt, 3211 SW 71st avenue.

The letter, dated July 20, and just received, also told of the soldier's promotion to corporal.

Corporal Barratt wrote, "Today I finally got the cake which you sent to Pueblo (Mrs. Barratt mailed the cake to her son, then stationed in Pueblo, Colo., in January). It followed me clear around the world. Unfortunately, I am forced to report that it was in sad shape. With tears streaming down our cheeks we gave it a decent burial."
Corporal Barratt, 24, graduate of Mill Plain high school, Vancouver; Clark, junior college and Reed college; the latter in 1940, was inducted in February, 1942. He went overseas to India in February of this year and was subsequently sent to China.
