An American Triumph—In Russia

We would be prouder still if we could know the exact extent of industry's monumental production for war. But it's a military secret, as it should be.

An indication of the vast total, however, is furnished by the recent lend-lease figures on our shipments to our Russian ally alone in the last two years—6,500 planes, 3,000 tanks, 125,000 sub-machine guns, 145,000 trucks, 25,000 jeeps, besides huge cargoes of metals, chemicals, explosives, food, etc.

Our influence is felt on every battlefield in the war. Even in those lands where no American soldier has yet set foot, the stamps "MADE IN AMERICA"—in the American way—may signify the difference between life and death.

You Owe \$1,203.71

You might not know it, but you owe \$1,203.71. So does your wife and for that matter each one of your children.

For that was the share of the public debt of every man, woman and child in the United States as of November 1.

And that's \$47.60 more than the per capita average a little more than a month ago; \$517.35 more than a year ago and \$952.53 higher than the peak World War I debt.

mand is permitted freely to work—as it must be in the long run—there is a considerable pyramiding of profits. For instance, when the farmer raises his price for wheat, the converters, wholesalers and retailers are not content to add the equivalent amount to the price of flour and bread but all increase their prices on a percentage basis. This could result in the price of bread increasing five cents when the farmer receives only one cent more for the wheat in the bread. Hence, the labor unions want subsidies.

President Roosevelt and his advisors are having a terrible struggle to keep wages at their present level and this can be done only by keeping prices at their present level. The Administration is in an especially tough spot at the present time because next year is election year. It will be very difficult to hold both the farmer vote and the labor vote, to say nothing regarding the consumers' vote. Subsidies do not solve the problem; but they could postpone the solution until after the election!

Subsidies are a Political Gamble. This country now is much like a man who needs to have a surgical operation, but he has some very important affairs facing him and cannot now afford the time to go to the hospital. Therefore, the doctors give him a belt to wear and certain pills to take which will delay the necessity of an immediate operation. Moreover, once in a while, during such a delay, nature cures the patient and the operation is not needed at all. Although believing in their hearts that the subsidy program will give only temporary aid, the President's advisors do know that there is one chance in ten of it giving permanent relief.

Subsidies are habit-forming. To start subsidies may be like a man starting to use a drug. A man believes he can quit it anytime, but too many have been badly disappointed. Subsidies are like certain drugs—useful on occasions, maybe, but dangerous. After subsidizing one product, producers of other products will try to get similar government aid; soon the country could be in an awful mess. As it is always easier to start a habit than to break it up, it will be much more difficult to cut off subsidies in many years to come, than to start them at the present time.

Some Subsidies Probably Wise. A further evil of subsidies is that they are never paid for by current taxes, but by selling government bonds and dumping the cost on future generations. Naturally, this is a popular argument; but a very questionable one in the sight of God. Finally, this question of subsidies is closely connected with the possible length of the War. If we are in for a long War there is no use of bothering with subsidies. We had better let nature take its course and inflation gradually increase with a slow rise in both prices and wages. Both must go up together and, hence, in the end no one group will be any better off.

On the other hand, if it is to be a short War, then subsidies can perform a real service even to the farmers by lessening the dangerous drop in farm prices which is sure to take place after the War. This is because subsidies will succeed in keeping down prices for a short time. (I will discuss the probable length of the War in my Annual Forecast which will be released on December thirtieth). Probably—as the lesser of two evils, a subsidy on a very few universally used products may now be wise.

"Collie" Died in Line of Duty

Fort Wayne, Ind., Dec. 17—When Donald Montooth, son of Howard Montooth, General Electric war worker here, offered his dog "Collie" for active service with the armed forces a short time ago, he took it for granted that some day Collie would be back again. Collie is not coming back for he died in the line of duty as a soldier.

The letter notifying Donald of Collie's death reads as follows: "It is with sincere regret that we must inform you your dog Collie died in the line of duty as a soldier October 21, 1943.

"We share with you the grief pursuant to the loss of your pet. All dogs become of very personal interest to us, and when, on rare occasions we lose one, it is a matter of real concern to all of the staff.

"Our only comfort lies in the fact that every possible care and treatment is accorded the fine animals in our charge; that our veterinarians are of the Army's finest; and that nothing that could have been done, was left undone."

The letter was signed by the executive officer of the Quartermaster Corps.
