Fourth War Loan Drive

Starts January 18
End February 15, 1944

The Fourth War Loan Drive will start on January 18 and end on February 15, 1944. The amount to be raised in the U. S. aggregates Fourteen Billion Dollars.

Washington County's quota has not as yet been allocated, but it will be approximately Two Million. During the last drive, we sold approximately Three Million Dollars in bonds.

The Fourth War Loan Drive quota of Fourteen Billion is to be raised from non-bank sources, that is, from individuals, corporations, and tax-paying bodies like cities and counties. With this in view, it is going to be necessary that every possible purchaser in our county be contacted. In order to do this, we have expanded our organization as follows: we have divided the county into six general areas with a general chairman in charge of each area. Then, in each area we have set up a bond committee in each school district with a chairman and from one to thirty additional workers. As a result, instead of having 250 workers like we had in the last drive, we will have approximately 700 people working in this great cause.

We—all of us Americans—are partners in one big business now. It's called The American War Effort, and it has enrolled the services of every citizen until the war is won. Some of us are in the fighting army; some in the production army; but all of us assist in the financial army. With the workers that we now have enrolled, no one will have to go out of their own school district in this work, and in addition, will not have to contact more than ten people.

Oregon's Freak Storm

Mrs. Marcia Pike, long time resident of Beaverton, recalls capricious storm of 1880.

We came to Oregon from Minnesota in 1877 and shortly thereafter settled on a farm which bordered some timberlands south of Beaverton.

This farm was commonly referred to as The McClurg Place—it originally having been owned and developed by a man named McClurg.

And thus it was that we were living on "The McClurg Place" when in January 1880, the most destructive storm during the entire period of the white occupancy of the Oregon country occurred. It was the 9th of January—just 63 years ago this month. As I recall it, and according to press reports and to the tales by the general public, that storm was remarkable in many particulars—chief of which was the enormous damage done within a relatively short space of time. The gale raged barely three hours, in the course of which the barometer attained a new low record and the wind rose to fifty miles an hour with intermittent gusts of 70 miles an hour.

Rain, mixed with snow and sleet, fell in pelting sheets. In Portland several hundred houses were unroofed or were completely demolished and the rescue work was seriously hampered, when not rendered absolutely impossible, by the unprecedented fury of the elements. Drains were inadequate, and the streets were impeded by the fallen structures and other debris as foods of water rushed its foat to the river.

Part of the roof of the state capitol was blown off and during repairs the supreme court was forced to move its quarters to the senate chambers.

Curiously, the day of the storm had opened exceptionally mild, even for January in Oregon. The sky had been clear and a balmy breeze blew in from the southeast. Nevertheless, at 10 o'clock a twenty mile wind blew up which straightway developed into a screaming gale, sweeping in a general course but exhibiting whirls and eddies similar to the irregular movements of tempestuous bodies of water. Men hurried hither and thither, eager, uncertain, and fearful; women and children with white, frightened faces peered through the windows of their homes, dreading to remain within yet not knowing where to flee for safety.

And havoc prevailed in forests and wrought indescribable damage to travel lanes throughout the state. Immense trees snapped at their roots then toppled over like the wooden pins in a bowling alley. They blocked highways and railroads and destroyed countless bridges. And out there on our farm we witnessed like destruction. We saw tall, proud, powerful trees—trees that had consumed hundreds of years in their making, away and stagger then crash with a thunderous roar to the ground. Our horses were seized with quivering fright. They chafed frantically at their halters and snorted with helpless fear. Even the dogs and chickens were affected by the terror of the storm.

Then, almost suddenly, the storm ceased. It had come unheralded and it departed as mysteriously as it came. Still bewildered, we stood by the window. A woman was approaching on horseback. It was Mrs. Downing from a neighboring ranch and she was half frozen and beside herself with anxiety over the probable fate of her dairy herd—turned out that morning to browse in the woods. I made her come in and fixed her a bowl of hot soup and poured some hot tea while my husband took up the search for her cows. He found them penned in by fallen trees. Three had been struck and lay dead which was the fate of large numbers of livestock all over the state.

Nothing remotely resembling that storm of January 9th, 1880, had ever been witnessed before in the memory of the whites and the oldest Indians testified that it had no prototype in aboriginal history or legend. The scientifically curious long afterward discussed the event in the desire to assign a cause but arrived at no conclusion. An abortive movement to provide protection against a recurrence was started but no one, it appeared, was able to offer a practical suggestion.

The remainder of that winter of 1880 was uneventful but those three awe-stricken hours furnished the populace conversational topic sufficient for many a long day.
