

Local Workers Help Exceed Ship-a-Day Promise Made in 1943

200,000 men and women from all parts of the country are sharing the company's honors in having achieved the greatest shipbuilding record in history during the year 1943-380 fighting and cargo ships.

The government has permitted Bethlehem to reveal the fact that it exceeded in output its promise, which seemed fantastic when made at the beginning of 1943, that it would turn out a ship a day of major fighting and cargo craft.

The remarkable program carried out by Bethlehem included a 35,000-ton battleship, 27,000-ton aircraft carriers, 14,700-ton carriers, 13,000-ton heavy cruisers, 10,000-ton light cruisers, 6,000-ton light cruisers, 2,100-ton destroyers, 1,820-ton destroyers, destroyer escorts, tank landing craft, infantry landing craft, and many types of cargo ships including a large number of Liberty ships and Victory ships.

The value of the year's work was equivalent to over 1,000 Liberty ships and, in terms of man-hours, the company estimates the 1943 program was equivalent to the construction of 22 battleships. Approximately 70% of the ships built were fighting craft and 30% cargo vessels.

In addition to the amazing production record of new ships, Bethlehem yards also repaired, converted and serviced over 7,000 vessels, thus playing a major role in keeping our fighting fleets in trim.

Approximately 300,000 men and women are employed by Bethlehem in its shipyards, steel mills and other divisions to accomplish this program. But because the company has set its sights still higher for 1944 it will be necessary to add still more to its present army of employees.

Mrs. America Meets the War

Take a look at the family's war ration books today to make certain that every one has the address on the cover filled in completely. This precaution has been suggested by the office of Price Administration because hundreds of lost ration books, which have been dropped in the mail by finders, are being sent to the dead letter office for lack of an address.

Many lost books could be returned if correct addresses were filled in on the covers. The post office has agreed to forward a lost ration book if the owner can be located.

Mrs. America's point stamps still will bring her about the same amount of rationed foods after the new ration token plan goes into effect the latter part of February. At the present time consumers get ration stamps in the amount of 64 points per month for fats and meats, and 48 points for processed foods.

So Mrs. America should come out about the same—except she'll get tokens worth one point in change, and those tokens will have no expiration date.

Boys Scouts to Help Distribute Posters

One hundred thousand Boy Scouts will distribute the Fourth War Loan Poster, "Buying A Bond Is No Sacrifice," to retail street-floor stores in 2,900 cities and towns on January 15, the Office of War Information announced recently.

More Tea for Civilians

About 76 million pounds of tea will be available to civilian consumers in 1944—wartime limitations on shipping space permitting. This is about 16 million pounds more than civilians got in 1943.

homes in their respective communities. Stock market booms benefit most all securities, but real estate or building booms may well be confined to certain definite areas.

The Postwar House In pre-war years, considerable progress was made in pre-fabricated construction. Methods of insulating heating, wiring, and plumbing have been so improved during the War that the pre-fabricated house industry may make quite a showing.

A recent survey covering 27,000 houses of this type shows that they can be built for from 10% to 20% below the cost of the conventional house. A very large number have been built for defense workers. Many of these may be moved to new sites. This, however, is an expensive job.

As pre-fabricated house manufacturers profit from recently learned construction lessons and as the ideal catches on, I expect to see a real market for houses of this type. Five or six years after the War fifty per cent of our new homes may be pre-fabricated in whole or in part.

A great deal of material can be saved and these savings passed on to the home owner. It may not be long before chain stores and department stores can carry a regular line of partially pre-fabricated houses. It is reasonable to expect that houses can be mass-produced as are automobiles.
