**All About the New Tokens**

Housewives will be able to buy about the same amount of rationed processed foods and meats and fats as they are now buying when the new ration token plan goes into effect February 27.

Major S. L. Damon chairman of the Beaverton War price and rationing board announced this week that point values will be adjusted slightly at the time tokens go into use in order to keep buying power on an even keel.

Under the token plan 30 points (3 stamps will become valid at the beginning of each two-week period for the purchase of meats and fats.

For processed foods 50 points will become valid the first of each month under the token plan.

The red and blue tokens, about the size of a dime, will be given in change by merchants when housewives spend their stamps at the beginning of each period.

Starting January 15, the OPA will make checks of gasoline coupons at banks where sheets of the coupons, bearing the filling station's name, are deposited by oil distributors.

This inspection will be part of the OPA's intensified drive against black market gasoline operations. Gallonage represented by the unendorsed coupons will be ordered deducted from the ration account of the depositing distributor, who, in turn, will be forced to call upon the offending filling station operator for valid stamps to replace the unendorsed ones.

The consequence of this procedure is that service station operators who continue to accept unendorsed coupons will find themselves gradually going out of business for lack of supplies.

Marmalades made from citrus fruits are point free. Some retailers had confused the jam and jelly regulations and were still collecting points for citrus marmalade.

**To Get 70% of Seeds**

Farmers, victory gardener and other civilians will receive 275,252,000 pounds or 70.3 percent of the supply of vegetable seeds allocated for all needs through June 30, the War Administration said recently. Although certain familiar varieties may be missing next spring, no gardener will need to be without enough seed for planting.

Portland, Ore., Jan. 28—The 33rd annual meeting of the West Coast Lumbermen's association will be held on Friday, Jan. 28, at the Multnomah Hotel, Portland. The program opens at 9:30 a. m. A luncheon program will be focused on post-war planning, with Oregon's Governor Earl Snell, WCLA President Orville R. Miller, and Charles L. Wheeler, President of Rotary International and executive vice president of Pope and Talbot, Inc. speaking to the association's members and guests.

**Bee Supplies Scarce**

Queen bees and package bees are extremely scarce and unless folks who are planning to purchase them this year get their orders in right away they are likely to find that their orders can't be filled, according to information from the state department of agriculture. In fact, some bee houses are already turning down orders for this season. Incidentally, beekeepers will find the price of queens and package bees is up about 10 per cent over 1943.
