months old owned or kept within the
State of Oregon over 30 days after

Surplus Carrots Can Be Fed to Poultry

Poultrymen who can purchase surplus
carrots this winter or spring at
reasonable price can make excellent
either for laying flocks or breeding
flocks of chickens or turkeys, says
Palmer S. Torvend, county agent. The
surplus of carrots in some sections of
the state has occurred at a time when
there is a shortage of other vitamin
A-bearing feeds, such as alfalfa meal,
yellow corn and fish oils.

Carrots can be fed poultry whole,
either in open troughs or on clean litter
or sod, says Torvend. Turkey
breeding hens will consume 20 to 30
pounds per 100 birds a day, while 100
laying hens will eat five to seven
pounds per day.

A deficiency of vitamin A in poultry
rations will cause stunted
growth, staggering gait, sore eyes,
reduced egg production, lower hatchability,
and greater susceptibility to infection
by the birds.

Operate 35 Centers

The American Red Cross is now operating
35 blood donor centers and
63 mobile units for the collection of
the precious fluid. The Army and
Navy have asked for 11,000,000 pints
of blood to be processed into the miracle
medicine—blood plasma. Already
6,000,000 pints have been collected
and the centers are going ahead
with their task at the rate of
100,000 pints weekly.

During the past year, 6,475,000 emergency
cases were handled by Home
Service, Camp and Hospital workers
and the 3,756 chapters in the country
for soldiers, ex-servicemen and their
families. These emergency cases included
every conceivable task—from
buying pigs for a boy's Christmas
present, to delivering tragic messages
of death. Daily thousands of cases
concerning allotments which have
been delayed, emergency loans, or
other problems are handled throughout
the nation. Every chapter is obligated
by the Congressional charter to
conduct Home Service. In 2,153
of the smaller chapters, this work is
done entirely by volunteers.

Federal Tax Returns Mch 15 Farmers Must File

Those who Must File Returns
Even though they filed declaration
of estimated tax in September or December,
the following persons in general
must file income tax returns on
or before March 15:

1. Every single person whose gross
income in 1943 was \$500 or more.

2. Every individual married person
whose gross income was more than
\$624.

3. Every married couple whose
combined gross income was \$1200 or
more.

4. Every person who paid or owed
a tax on 1942 income.

Excepted from filing on March 15
are servicemen and others outside
the country if the wife's own income
is less than \$1200.

The Bureau of Internal Revenue
advises all persons to file returns
early to determine how they stand.
Many people will be about even with
the government, a number of people
will find they have a sizeable payment
to make, and still others will find
that the government owes them money.
