News for Fishermen

Final action regarding the 1944 angling regulations was taken by the Oregon State Game Commission when it met in Portland on January 29th. Effective February 1 will be the new regulations on steelhead and salmon over 20 inches in length. In the coastal streams the bag limit was five fish a day, but now the limit in all sections will be three fish a day or nine in any seven consecutive days or in possession at any one time. There will be no bag limit, however, on jack salmon under 20 inches in length.

The six inch trout season will open on April 15 and close October 31. The bag limit remains the same as before, 15 fish or 15 pounds and 1 fish in any one day but not to exceed 30 fish or 30 pounds and 2 fish in any 7 consecutive days in possession at anyone time.

For Diamond Lake a minimum length limit of ten inches was established, but the 1943 bag limit of 5 fish and season from May 20 to September 20 will be in effect. The special season of June 1 to October 31 on the upper part of the North Umpqua was abolished and this section of the river, therefore, will be open to winter fishing for steelhead over 20 inches.

A special season from April 15 to August 1 was provided for that part of Tanner Creek from its mouth to a point 200 feet below the fishway and in the Columbia river from the dam to a point 400 feet below the west bank of Tanner Creek. This area will be closed to all fishing the remainder of the year.

A few other changes were made in some of the county regulations which will be listed in the official synopsis of angling regulations that will be available for distribution sometime in March.

Gas Consumption Dropped 13 per cent below 1942

Motor vehicle travel in Oregon during the year 1943, as revealed in gasoline consumption for that year, dropped 13 per cent below the figures for 1942, according to Secretary of State, Bob Farrell, who today announced gas consumption figures for the past year.

During the year, Oregon motorists used 229,773,825 gallons of gasoline compared to a consumption of 263,805,921 gallons in 1942.

Total tax paid on 1943 gasoline amounted to \$11,488,691.54, compared to \$13,190,297.33 in 1942.
