RATION BOOK REMINDER

Cut this out and keep it in your
purse or billfold.

ADVANCE PORK RATION—
OPA has validated these 216 meat
points for advance use in purchase of
pork on the farm only: Last 96
brown points in book No. 3 and red
stamps numbered "8" and lettered
"A" through "M" in book No. 4 (each
red stamp good for 10 points, re-
gardless of the point value printed on
them).

RATION BOOK NO. 3—
Brown Stamps, for purchase of meats
fats, etc.

Feb. 26—Expiration date of brown
stamps V, W, and X.

March 20—Expiration date of brown
stamps Y and Z.

RATION BOOK NO. 4—
Feb. 26—Expiration date of spare
stamp No. 3, good for 5 points of
pork.

March 20—Expiration date of green
stamps K, L and M. Tokens will be
given on and after February 27, in
change.

May 20—Expiration date of red
stamps AS, BS, CS, DS, ES and FS in
ration book No. 4 (meat, fish, fats,
cheese, canned milk, fish, oils) Each
stamp has a 10-point value. Series
AS, BS, and CS, valid on Feb. 27;
series DS, ES, and FS valid on March
12.

May 20—Expiration date of blue
stamps AS, BS, CS, DS, ES, and FS in
ration book 4 (processed fruits and
vegetables, jams and jellies). All
valid starting Feb. 27. Each stamp
has a 10-point value.

RATION TOKENS—
February 27—Starting date for use
of red and blue ration tokens.

SUGAR—
March 31—Expiration date of Su-
gar stamp 30, Book 4, good for 5 lbs.
sugar.

Feb. 28, 1945—Stamp 40, Book 4,
valid for 5 pounds canning sugar.

SHOES—
Stamp No. 18, Book 1, and Air-
plane stamp No. 1, Book 3, valid
indefinitely for one pair each. Loose
stamps not accepted.

FUEL OIL—
March 13—Expiration date of period
3 fuel oil coupon. Period 4 cou-
pons valid February 8 to September
30. Not more than 63 per cent of
season's rations should have been
used to date.

GASOLINE—
March 21—Expiration date of No.
10 coupons in A book, 3 gal. each.
Coupons must be endorsed as soon as
received—your protection against the
black market.

TIRE INSPECTION—
A every 6 months. by March 31,
1944.

B every 4 months by February 28,
1944.

C every 3 months by Feb. 28, 1944.

T every 6 mo or 5,000 miles of
driving.

STOVES—
Purchase certificates obtainable at
local ration board.

WOOD, SAWDUST, COAL.
Fuel dealers must deliver wood,
sawdust and coal on priority based
on consumer need, with those having
less than three months' supply com-
ing first.

Use Of Stamps Feb. 27 To Mch. 20

During the three-week period from
Feb. 27, when the new ration token
plan begins, and March 20, when the
last of the green stamps good for
buying processed foods run out, one-
point green stamps, along with to-
kens, may be given as "change"
when processed foods are bought, the
district Office of Price Administra-
tion, announced this week.

When one-point brown stamps
(for meats-fats) have been used for
change making in the past, use of
one-point green stamps had not, be-
fore now, been authorized by the ra-
tioning regulations. "It is desirable
to permit their use during the three
week transition period since it is pos-
sible that tokens may not be well dis-
tributed in some sections, and for a
time the one-point green stamps,
along with the one-point brown
stamps, may be needed in a few lo-
calities for change making.

During the three-week transition
period from the old rationing program
to the simplified token plan, two
sets of stamps will be used for pro-
cessed foods and two for meats-fats.

Blue 10-point stamps AS, BS, CS, DS
and ES in War Ration Book Four
may be used for processed foods from
Feb. 7 through May 20. Green stamps
K, L, and M in the same ration book
may be used for processed foods from
February 27 through March 20.

Blue tokens and green one-point
stamps may be used as change.

Red Stamps AS, BS, and CS in War
Ration Book Four will be good for
meats-fats February 27 and through
May 20. Red stamps DS, ES and FS
will be good March 12 through May
20. Red stamps Y and Z in War
Ration Book Three will be good through
March 20. Red tokens and brown
one-point stamps may be used as
change.

Green stamps K, L and M and
brown stamps Y and Z will retain
their old values of 8, 5, 2 and 1
points.

Tokens will be given as "change"
for blue and green, red and brown
ration stamps only when a purchase
is made. No more than nine tokens
may be given as "change" in one
transaction.

Since both the green and brown
stamps run out on March 20, the
simple token plan will be fully in ef-
fect on March 21.

QUOTING ABRAHAM LINCOLN

Should a President, whether or not
he is himself a candidate for re-elec-
tion, take charge of the business of
providing for ballots for the soldier
vote? A good example was set by
President Lincoln, who took this po-
sition:

"I can have nothing to do with the
matter. By the Constitution and the
laws the President is charged with
no duty in a Presidential election in
any state."

Timely and deserving of prayerful
consideration are also these utter-
ances by Lincoln:

"It is impossible to destroy this
Union except by some action not pro-
vided for in the constitution."

"The right of each state to control
its own domestic institutions accord-
ing to its own judgment exclusively
is essential to that balance of power
on which the perfection and endur-
ance of our political fabric depends."

Red Cross Field Men Tackle Yanks' Problems Overseas



One of the very important functions of the American Red Cross is the direct
communication it affords between the fighting man and his people back home.

On Masera Island, up in the Persian
Gulf, where there is not a single tree
standing and the wind blows across
the island ceaselessly, Red Cross field
men brought fishing tackle, books and
writing paper to service men. Most
welcome gift from the Red Cross was
clippers for hair cutting—the boys had
been without a barber for months.

In Persia, a Red Cross Field Direc-
tor was able to locate a soldier's moth-
er whom he hadn't seen for 25 years.

In Africa, Red Cross field men flew
in Army planes, hitch-hiked in supply
trucks, bumped in jeeps over bombed
convoy routes, through blinding sand
storms and glaring sun to help men
with personal problems and emergency
communications, and to deliver maga-
zines and books, cigarettes and choco-
late to isolated posts and bases.

In Italy, Red Cross field men ac-
companied the troops in on the inva-
sion barges.

In India, a sergeant was sentenced
to the guard house for disorderly con-
duct. His officer couldn't understand
the boy's behaviour. He was a nice kid
—he'd never gone to pieces before.

The officer asked the Red Cross
Field Director to see him. The Red
Cross man discovered a very worried
boy. His wife had not been receiving
his allotments, she wasn't well and
needed an operation. She thought the
soldier must have cancelled his allot-
ments and a misunderstanding had
arisen between them so that she was
no longer writing him.

The field man got in touch with the
Red Cross chapter in the boy's home
town immediately. It took care of her.

financed her operation and saw that
she had adequate funds to provide for
herself until the allotment again came
through.

When the Red Cross man explained
what had happened to the soldier's
Commanding Officer, the latter promp-
tly released the boy from the guard
house. From then on the boy was all
right. His worries were over, and the
Army had gained a good fighting man.

All over the world, in every thea-
tre of war and active battle front go
the American Red Cross field men—
helping soldiers with major and minor
personal problems, bringing them rec-
reational items such as magazines,
books, comfort articles, athletic equip-
ment, and re-establishing their contact
with home. These men share the con-
ditions and hazards under which the
soldiers fight. They also share their
lives. They are on call day and night
whenever they are needed.

G.I.'s overseas have many problems.
Often home seems very, very far away.
With the Red Cross there at hand
wherever he may be, the soldier knows
he can always get in touch with home
—that he need never feel alone with
problems he doesn't know how to solve
himself. More than 3,000,000 service
men passed through Red Cross field
men's offices last year.

On the mud clogged roads of Italy,
through the far jungles of New Guinea,
on lonely desert posts, Red Cross field
men take your place beside your boy.
In order to continue this service, the
Red Cross urgently needs contributions
from the American people to its \$200,
000,000 War Fund drive this month.
