Need Only One Ration Book

Mrs. America will have only one ration book to think about for meats, fats and processed foods rationing programs after the introduction of ration tokens as change at midnight February 27. After that date, all stamps validated will be from War Ration Book Four—red for meats and fats and blue for processed foods. The red and blue stamps will have a flat ten point value regardless of the number on the face of coupons. However, green K, L and M stamps in War Ration Book Four, which will be valid until March 20th, will be good only for face value. The same is true of brown stamps Y and Z in War Ration Book Three. Ration tokens can be given in change for the left over green and brown stamps.
