Farmers Should Improve
Their Land—Better Crops

The 1944 AAA program includes
practices for improving pasture lands,
reports Palmer S. Torvend, county
agent, in announcing details of pro-
duction practices expressly designed
for increasing output of livestock
products.

Abundant pastures will both in-
crease production and cut down pro-
duction costs, especially for the dairy
producer, the 1944 program affords
county producers unlimited opportu-
nity for carrying out proven practices
for stepping up carrying capacity of
our pastures.

Removal of farm allowance limi-
tations will permit a farm operator
to carry out and receive payment for
as many production practices as
his farm needs, Washington county
AAA committeemen believe. This
and the wide range of practices in-
cluded in the program offer a maxi-
mum of assistance to livestock pro-
ducers in building up pastures for
greater production of milk and meat.
Practices and rates of payment in-
clude:

Application of lime and phosphate
at \$6.30 a ton for 95 percent lime
and \$24 a ton for 20 percent phos-
phate.

Construction of drainage ditches
and tile drainage at \$3 per 100 line-
ar feet for open ditches, and 40 cents
a rod for tile drainage.

Control of destructive plants, such
as briars, poison oak, blackberries
and similar plants, \$1 to \$4 an acre,
depending on degree of infestation.

Improving pastures by removal of
shrubs and logs, leveling hummocks,
rodent control removing loose stones,
and debris, \$5 an acre.

Mowing weeds in pastures, 50 cents
per acre for each mowing.

Rodent control, 10 cents per pound
of poison bait used.

Seeding pastures, 15 cents to 45
cents per pound of seed, depending
on varieties used.

Many of the practices require prior
approval of the county AAA commit-
tee before payment may be author-
ized for them, to make sure they will
make an adequate contribution to
increasing production, the committeemen
pointed out. Farmers who want
to earn payment for carrying out the
practices should make sure they work
out a plan sheet with their commu-
nity committeeman or at the county
office in Hillsboro during the next
few months, in connection with their
sign-up for 1944 war food production.

RATION BOOK REMINDER

Cut this out and keep it in your
purse or billfold.

ADVANCE PORK RATION—
OPA has validated these 216 meat
points for advance use in purchase of
pork on the farm only: Last 96
brown points in book No. 3 and red
stamps numbered "S" and lettered
"A" through "M" in book No. 4 (each
red stamp good for 10 points, re-
gardless of the point value printed on
them).

RATION BOOK NO. 3—
Brown Stamps, for purchase of meats
fats, etc.
March 20—Expiration date of brown
stamps Y and Z.

RATION BOOK NO. 4—
March 20—Expiration date of green
stamps K, L and M. Tokens will be
given on and after February 27, in
change.

May 20—Expiration date of red
stamps AS, BS, CS, DS, ES and FS in
ration book No. 4 (meat, fish, fats,
cheese, canned milk, fish, oils) Each
stamp has a 10-point value. Series
AS, BS, and CS, valid on Feb. 27;
series DS, ES, and FS valid on March
12.

May 20—Expiration date of blue
stamps AS, BS, CS, DS, and ES, in ra-
tion book 4 (processed fruits and
vegetables, jams and jellies). All
valid starting Feb. 27, such stamp
has a 10-point value.

SUGAR—
Stamp No. 30 in book No. 4 valid
indefinitely for five pounds.

Stamp No. 31 will become valid
April 1 for five pounds.

Stamp No. 40 valid for five pounds
home canning sugar to February
28, 1945.

SHOES—
Stamp No. 18, Book 1, and Air-
plane stamp No. 1, Book 3, valid
indefinitely for one pair each. Loose
stamps not accepted.

OPA has announced another shoe
stamp designated will become valid
May 1.

FUEL OIL—
March 13—Expiration date of per-
iod 3 fuel oil coupon. Period 4
coupons valid February 8 to September
30. Not more than 63 per cent of
season's rations should have been
used to date.

GASOLINE—
March 21—Expiration date of No.
10 coupons in A book, 3 gal. each.
Coupons must be endorsed as soon as
received—your protection against the
black market.

TIRE INSPECTION—
A every 6 months, by March 31,
1944.
B every 4 months by February 28,
1944.
C every 3 months by Feb. 28, 1944.
T every 6 mo or 5,000 miles of
driving.

STOVES—
Purchase certificates obtainable at
local ration board.

WOOD, SAWDUST, COAL
Fuel dealers must deliver wood,
sawdust and coal on priority based
on consumer need, with those having
less than three months' supply com-
ing first.
