A Gasoline Coupons to be Cut March 22

Price Administrator C. Bowles today ordered the "A" gasoline ration in all states west of the Allegheny mountains cut from three to two gallons a week, effective March 22.

He also reduced the permissible "B" mileage in five Pacific states by 60 miles a month.

No changes were made in any gasoline rations in the 17 East Coast states. Nor were "C" rations anywhere affected.

"A-1" coupons, which become valid March 22 in all parts of the country, except the Atlantic seaboard will have to last three months instead of two. OPA will end the requirement that 60 miles a month occupational mileage be taken out of the "A" ration before a motorist becomes eligible for a supplemental B or C ration.

New Tax Forms Due Next Month

Almost before the ink is dry on their March 15 returns, 15 million taxpayers will be confronted with a new tax form due April 15—the revised declaration for estimating 1944 income, required of persons whose taxes are not fully covered by withholding.

Forms will be mailed out this week, late enough so as not to add to the confusion occasioned by the 1943 returns due Wednesday.

There is no connection between the 1943 return and the 1944 declaration.

Use Only One Ration Book After March 20

Mrs. America will be carrying only one food ration book with her when she goes to market after March 20th. For on that date, brown stamps Y and Z in War Ration book Three, now good for meats, and fats, will expire. Book Four contains red stamps for meats and the blue stamps for processed foods. Each of these now has a point value of ten regardless of the printed numbers. Book Four also contains green stamps K, L and M, currently valid for processed foods. Since the green stamps expire on March 20th, these should be used before starting on the new blue stamps. Sugar Stamp No. 30, which is good indefinitely, also is in Book Four.
