Nazis Close Schools And Arrest Students

In German-occupied countries, uni-
versity students who refuse to regis-
ter for labor or who displease the
Axis authorities in some way are
often arrested and their schools closed.
The climax of a two-year at-
tempt by the Nazis to subdue Norwe-
gian students and educators came
when the bulk of the student body
and faculty of the University of Oslo
(1,200 of 1,500 students) was arrested
without warning last November 30.
women students were sent back to
their home localities. The men were
ordered sent to a special internment
camp inside Germany.

A similar incident occurred at the
University of Strasbourg at Cler-
mont-Ferrand. (The university was
moved in 1939 from the City of Stras-
bourg, near the French-German bor-
der to Clermont-Ferrand in central
France.) On November 25, 1943;
between 400 and 500 students were
arrested. One professor was shot for
not raising his hands quickly enough.
By December 2, approximately a doz-
en professors and 88 students were
still imprisoned.

Students Fight Back

Students in the occupied countries
are doing their part to hasten the
defeat of the Axis. In the Netherlands
the student "underground" press has
played a major part in the campaign
against forced labor. About 5,600
Dutch students are in hiding, and
freshman registration at Dutch uni-
versities for the 1943-44 session is one-
tenth of the prewar figure because
all students are required to sign a
"declaration of obedience to the Ger-
mans."

Technical students in Copenhagen,
Denmark, have placed specialized
knowledge of explosives at the dis-
posal of sabotage groups, and at least
one student has been killed in this
work. In Czechoslovakia, articles
appear in the secret press urging in-
structors to teach Czechoslovak his-
tory and language instead of German.
Belgian students have founded two
"underground" newspapers, and the
Danish students' organization prints
a news letter which is well informed
about the meeting of the cabinet and
other important bodies.

HERE IS THAT "BOB-TAILED" BALLOT

The Green-Lucas Bill—a bill "to amend the Act of September 16, 1942, which
provided a method of voting, in time of war, by members of the land and naval
forces absent from the place of their residence," prescribes in Section 104 (a)
the following form for an—

OFFICIAL FEDERAL WAR BALLOT

Instruction.—To vote write in the name of the candidate of your
choice for each office.

Electors of President and Vice President of the United States
(A vote for President includes a vote for Vice President of the same party.)

Write in the name of your choice for President.

United States Senator

(ONLY if a Senator is to be elected in your state.)

Write in the name of your choice for Senator.

United States Senator, Unexpired Term

(ONLY if a Senator is to be elected in your State for an unexpired term.)

Write in the name of your choice for Senator.

Representative in Congress for Your District

Write in the name of your choice for Repre-
sentative in Congress for your district.

Representative at Large in Congress

(ONLY in the States entitled thereto.)

Vote for one or two as
the case may be

Write in the name or names of your choice for
Representative at Large.

Section 104 (a) of the Green-Lucas Bill states further that "a vote by party
designation shall be deemed a vote for the candidate of that party by name. . . .
No ballot shall be invalid by reason of mistake or omission in writing in the
name of the candidate or his political party where the candidate or party in-
tended by the voter is plainly identifiable."

Printed herewith is the proposed Federal ("Bobtail") War Ballot
which, if the Administration has its way, will be used by members
of the armed forces in the forthcoming election.

The halls of Congress have resounded with criticism regarding
this short ballot.

Republicans and a large number of Democrats have opposed its
adoption for the following reasons:

1. It denies the service man and woman the same full partici-
pation in the November election that the civilian here at home
enjoys.
2. It restricts the service man and woman to a vote for Federal
officers—President, Vice President and members of Congress
—ONLY.
3. Voters in the armed forces would be partially disfranchised in
that they could not participate in state, county and local elec-
tions. They would not be permitted to vote for any of the 34
Governors who will be elected in November.
4. The ballot carries no names of candidates, thus preventing the
casting of an intelligent ballot.
5. The ballot is clearly illegal and unconstitutional, ignores the
requirements of state election laws and therefore could not
be legally counted by election judges in many states.
6. In the event of a contested election, which the Federal "bob-
tailed" ballot clearly invites, the nation would face a chaotic
situation.

Proponents of the State Soldier Ballot, as opposed to the Federal
plan, have shown that the states are preparing to give the Soldier,
Sailor, Marine and Coastguardsman full participation in the next
election—the same kind of participation given citizens at home. The
War and Navy Departments have been called upon to furnish trans-
portation for the full state ballot and it has been conclusively proven
that such transportation will in no way interfere with the war effort.
