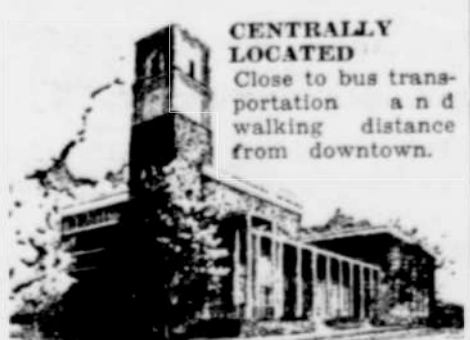

Mrs. America Meets the War

Mrs. America now has a total of 90 points valid for the purchase of meats and fats. Three new red stamps in ration book four—GS-HS and J-S—were validated for ten points each on March 26 and will be good indefinitely. Meantime, red stamps AS, BS, CS, DS, ES, and FS in the same book each are good for ten points and will be valid indefinitely. So, if you have a few tokens and want to make a point purchase, spend them before you spend your stamps. Keep your stamps as you would a ten dollar bill. Don't spend them until all your tokens are used up.

When Mrs. America takes the family's shoes to the cobbler for resoling or other mending to make them last as long as possible, her dealer should have sufficient leather for those repairs. The War Production Board has just authorized more leather to repair shops for the period from April 1 to June 30 to take care of the extra work. And on the subject of shoe repairs, this service is under OPA price control. In general shoe repairs should not cost more than they did in March, 1942. Every shoe repair man must keep a list of his ceiling prices and he must show it to customers if they ask to see it.



What Is the Charles A. Coffin Foundation?

THE PURPOSE of the Charles A. Coffin Foundation is to encourage and reward distinguished achievement in the electrical field by "prizes to employees; by recognition to lighting, power, and railway companies for improvement in service to the public; by fellowships to deserving graduate students; and by the grant of funds for research work at technical schools and colleges."
