Fifth
War LoanScheduled for June 12-July 8
Must Raise 16 Billion Dollars

Americans will be asked to loan the government 6 billion dollars between June 12 and July 8 to meet the \$16,000,000,000 goal set for the fifth war loan.

Secretary Henry Morgenthau declared that the treasury must borrow a great deal of money this year to keep the war going.

Direct war costs since January have exceeded \$23,000,000,000 with the critical phase of the war still ahead, the country will need more than twice as much as we can expect to get in taxes.

Commercial banks are ruled out of participating and the major emphasis will be put in individual purchases. No mention was made on E bond quota.

Corporations, and other big money investors are looked to for \$10,000,000,000. They had over subscribed in the 4th war loan by \$2,921,000,000 while individuals fell \$191,000,000 short of their mark. E bond buyers went three billion over their quota of 187 million.

J. O. Johnson Files for
State Representative

J. O. Johnson, former representative of Washington County, again seeks the nomination for that office. For fifteen years Mr. Johnson has been a resident of Washington County and active in civic affairs, particularly in the Tigard district. Mr. Johnson has also filed for delegate at large for the Republican National Convention at Chicago. His platform as candidate for the legislature is brief and to the point. "Common sense legislation only. The fewer the laws the better the Government. Domestic affairs should be administered by our duly elected state officials, not by New York politicians temporarily residing in Washington."

In his declaration of delegate, he states that he will help nominate "a fighting American of proven Christian character" and assist in adopting a platform which will provide for:

Return to the States, administration of all activities of government as intended by our Constitution. Return of Government by law instead of government by executive order. Establishment of permanent Courts for settlement of problems of Industry, Labor and Agriculture through collective bargaining with adequate protection for the average citizen. Permanent international organizations established on the theory that all men are created equal and that all problems, both economic and political, can and must be settled by arbitration. A job for every returned soldier through cooperation with business instead of Government dole.

Mr. Johnson was a Federal employee in the Bureau of Internal Revenue for eleven years, spending eight years in Washington and three years on the Pacific coast as clerk and attorney. For fifteen years he has been practicing law with offices in Portland and for several years at Tigard. He was Representative in Washington County in 1933. In 1941 he purchased an interest in Sken Electric Works and for the past two years has been president of the company. He is a past commander of the West Hills Legion Post of Multnomah and past president of the Tigard Lions Club, and belongs to various civic and fraternal organizations in Metzger, Tigard and Sherwood. He is Director and attorney for Washington Federal Savings and Loan Association of Hillsboro.

Sugar for Home Canning
Housewives who are planning to can early fruits and vegetables and make their year's supply of jellies and jams, may now obtain their five pounds of sugar from their grocers for this purpose by using sugar stamp number 4 in War Ration Book Four.

This stamp valid thru Feb. 28, 1945. Additional 20 pounds can be secured for each person in the family by securing a form from the board. Ration books will not have to be sent with the application but spare stamp No. 37 in Ration Book Four will be used instead.

Defying
God's PlanBabson Pleads for
Nature's Way of Living

Babson Park, Florida, April 7—It is very interesting to note the relative number of letters coming to me as the result of different subjects on which I write. Some columns upon which I spend much time will get very few "fan" letters; while others, written quickly, will pull large mails. It is of further interest that my biggest mails will come when I mention birds, children, national parks, religious or other subjects not of an economic nature.

My recent reference to the Williston Bird Sanctuary at Babson Park, Massachusetts, has brought a very large mail from bird lovers. They emphasize that the hundreds of millions of dollars now being spent to spray fruit, vegetables and trees could be wholly saved if we would protect the birds.

Other readers constantly urge me to condemn forest fires and the cutting of any trees without systematic reforestation. Protecting our forests would prevent floods and soil erosion. This would greatly reduce the need of buying fertilizer and prevent the terrific waste in crops from poor top soil. There is also a strong sentiment to prevent speculation in natural resources—such as oil, metals and timber and having them owned by the Government.

There is great danger in interfering with nature's plans. This includes scores of very important things from birth control to price-fixing; including the ruthless cutting of timber and
