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Keep It Flying

Government by Executive Order?

It is revealing, to say the least, to hear from Minnesota's Senator Shipstead that, while Congress has enacted 4,503 laws in the last ten years, the President has issued 3,703 Executive Orders.

Sponsoring a Senate resolution which would authorize a Congressional review of Executive Orders, the Minnesotan believes it is in the duty of the law-makers elected by the people to "find out about the source of authority and see if we want this situation continued".

Senator Shipstead describes the situation as "bad and dangerous" and bids it "could go on until we had nothing left but Executive Orders."

A people who have seen their country grow great and powerful in a system of liberty and self-government—a government of laws, not of men—will weigh the Minnesota Senator's warning when he says: "If you can pass a law by Executive Order, Congress might as well go home."

Patriotism in Reverse

Strikers recently tied up five big Portland, Oregon, sawmills, while the workers went into a special meeting to discuss wage demands.

What irony! If union officials or the men had any interest in the American soldiers at the front waiting for supplies, they would have held their meetings to discuss wage demands after working hours, and they would have stayed at their jobs producing lumber, just as our armed forces are staying at the front and losing their lives in order that workers at home may draw high wages, enjoy family life, and enjoy the right to strike.

Men sanctioning such work stoppages should be ashamed to show their faces in public.

We wish to congratulate the Hillsboro Argus which last week celebrated its 50th anniversary. Special praise is due Mrs. Emma C. McKinney, who also completes 40 years as a publisher. It is a source of great pride to other business women that she has succeeded in her line.

Augment Supplies with Wood, Coal, Fuel Users Urged

"Now is the time for persons whose primary fuel is oil to buy wood or coal for auxiliary fuel for next year," James C. Scully, OPA regional fuel rationing representative, advised today. "Fuel oil consumers should realize that there is extremely likely to be a serious shortage of fuel during the coming fall and winter and that they may have to augment the heat so obtained with other fuels. Fireplaces may cease to be ornaments and become important adjuncts of the oil heating systems."

Persons who do not burn fuel oil are also urged to fill up their sawdust bins and to order wood and coal now for next winter's use.

PEACE USES FOUND FOR WAR MUD DRIER

American industry has mapped out a whole series of postwar uses for the anti-mud powder it has developed for use on military roads and landing fields.

The powder waterproofs the surface of the soil for about 30 cents a square yard. It is said to be effective for at least five years. In peacetime it can be used on farm roads, earth dams, factory yards, tennis courts, and on the shoulders of paved highways.

Cook cabbage quickly to get the most of its goodness. Bring small amount of water to boil, put in cabbage, and cook for 15 to 18 minutes—less time for shredded cabbage.

Low cost, low point Lamb Cuts are as tasty as lamb chops. Broil the shank or flank, or grind up the meat on them and make them into patties or a lamb loaf.

drilling for oil. In fact, it appears that the Old Deal has interfered with God's Plans as much as the New Deal. It temporarily would cause hardships to repeal 1,000 or more of our laws; but the result, in the end, would benefit every honest employer, wage worker and investor. When a law is passed by Democrats or Republicans which interferes with nature's program it, like a lie, must be followed up by more laws or lies in order to enforce or cover up the first mistake.

On the other hand, I heartily approve the recent decision of the R. F. C. to loan money to returning soldiers to re-establish them in business. Thus a soldier who sold his garage, or filling station, or retail store to enter the armed forces, may borrow funds upon his return to buy the business back or buy some other business. The applicant, must of course, show previous experience and put up some money of his own. Service Men's wives should write their husbands about this, and, if interested, make application for them at their local bank or at the nearest R. F. C. Agency.

Don't Be Greedy
Fundamental lessons must be learned by employers, wage earners and investors. Corporations must learn that it is dangerous to become too large. Growth is not wrong; but bigness develops jealousy and invites anti-monopoly attacks. Wage workers should learn that their Unions will ultimately be subject to the same laws as all corporations. RATION BOOK REMINDER

Cut this out and keep it in your purse or billfold.

ADVANCE PORK RATION— OPA has validated these 216 meat points for advance use in purchase of pork on the farm only: Last 96 brown points in book No. 3 and red stamps numbered "8" and lettered "A" through "M" in book No. 4 (each red stamp good for 10 points, regardless of the point value printed on them).

MEATS—FATS— Book 4 Red Stamps A8 through J8 are good indefinitely. Waste kitchen fats exchanged for two points and four cents a pound.

PROCESSED FRUITS—Vegetables— Blue Stamps A8 through K8 are good indefinitely.

SUGAR— Stamp No. 30 in book No. 4 valid indefinitely for five pounds. Stamp No. 31 will become valid April 1 indefinitely.

For canceling only: Sugar Stamp 40 valid for 5 pounds through Feb. 28, 1945. Apply to local boards on Form R-323 for remainder (20 lbs. max. per person) affixing spare stamp 37 for each person, (after March 23).

SHOES—Loose Stamps Invalid— Book 1—Stamp 18, valid for one pair thru April 30.

Book 3—Airplane stamp No. 1, valid indefinitely for one pair. (New stamp to become valid May 1 for one pair.

FUEL OIL— September 30: Expiration date of period 4 and 5 coupons.

TIRE INSPECTION— "A" every 6 months; "B" every 4 months; "C" every 3 months; "T" every 6 months, or 5,000 miles of driving.

SOLID FUELS— Dealers deliver by priorities based on needs.

GASOLINE COUPONS— Not valid Unless Endorsed— June 21—Expiration date of No. 11 "A" coupons. (May renew B or C coupons within but not before 15 days from date on cover.)

PRICE CONTROL— Refer price inquiries and complaints to price clerk at your local board.

INCOME TAX— Declaration of estimated 1944 tax are due by April 15.
