NOTICE OF SPECIAL SCHOOL MEETING AND ELECTION IN SCHOOL DISTRICT NO. 48 WASHINGTON COUNTY, OREGON

NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN That a special school meeting and election will be held in the high school building in Beaverton, Oregon, within School District No. 48, at 8:00 p. m. on the 24th day of April, 1944, for the purpose of submitting to the legal voters of the district the following propositions:

1. Shall District No. 48, Washington County, Oregon, unite with School Districts No. 6, 18, 37, 57, 60, 74, 81, 94, 95, 107 and 108, all of Washington County, Oregon; 62 Jt., Washington County, and 62 Jt., Multnomah County, being one joint district; 67 Jt., Washington County, and 67 Jt., Multnomah County, being one joint district; 83 Jt., Washington County, and 8 Jt., Multnomah County, being one joint district; and 104 Jt., Washington County, but omitting 42 Jt., Multnomah County, the other portion of said joint district, to form a union high school district?

For Union High School—Yes.

For Union High School—No.

2. Shall District No. 48 turn over and convey, without consideration, to said union high school district, if organized, for the purpose of furnishing a site for the high school in said proposed union high school district, the present

high school site and building of School District No. 48; said site being in Washington County, Oregon, and described as follows:

Commencing at the southeast corner of Lot 2, A. Meier Estate Addition to Beaverton, a plat of record in Washington County, Oregon; thence northeasterly along the west line of Stott Street extended in the Town of Beaverton to its intersection with the south line of Second Street in the Town of Beaverton, which point is also 60 feet westerly from the north-west corner of Block 24 in the Town of Beaverton; thence westerly along the south line of Second Street extended westerly in Beaverton to the intersection with the east line of Erickson Avenue in Beaverton; thence southerly along the east line of Erickson Avenue in Beaverton to the southwest corner of Lot 2 in the said A. Meier Estate Addition; thence easterly along said south line of said Lot 2 to the place of beginning.

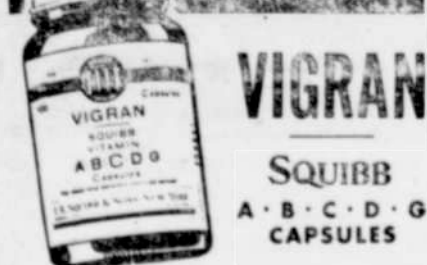
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
