Money For Schools

Extra Income Goes To Different Counties

Secretary of State Robert S. Farrell has announced the distribution of \$3,520,859 in surplus income money among the counties of the state for support of the public schools. Of the total amount distributed, \$2,500,000 represents the semi-annual apportionment of the newly created state school support fund while \$1,020,859.75 represents the semi-annual apportionment of the two-mill elementary school fund. The apportionment of the two funds, in each instance a duplication of a similar amount distributed last October, follows:

Multnomah County will receive \$356,465 and \$70,509.

Washington county receives \$29,288 and \$103,243.

To Organize Six Rural Fire Districts

A number of people from different districts met recently with the county court to discuss plans to organize six more rural fire districts in Washington county. Boundary lines were planned for Cornelius, Hillsboro, Cedar Mill, Beaverton, Tualatin and Gaston area and petitions will now be circulated.

Following the organization, taxpayers in the various districts will determine amount of fire fighting equipment they need and vote a tax which will be carried on the county rolls. It is hoped to have the districts organized in time to include the tax on the rolls next year.

This plan will assure the districts of fire protection as co-operation with nearby city fire departments is planned.

Roberta Whatley Married Recently

Senator Holman Has a Good Record



"Senator Rufus C. Holman has a record of public service rivaled by few," declared C. C. Hall, chairman of the "Keep Senator Holman Committee" today in predicting the re-nomination of the senator in the forthcoming Republican primary by a handsome majority.

"Senator Holman has rendered signal service to the nation in the prosecution of the war, and rare service to the state in the development of its resources," continued Hall.

"Long before the Pearl Harbor attack, Senator Holman espoused our two ocean navy and an increase of more than \$700,000,000 in the appropriation for our armed forces.

"After the Pearl Harbor attack Senator Holman took immediate steps to have a subcommittee of the military affairs committee named with himself as a member to co-operate with the commanders of our armed forces in driving the Japs out of the Aleutians and to build up our Pacific Coast defenses.

"The Japs are out of the Aleutians, and our coast defenses are invulnerable to attack by an enemy landing force.

"The Senator has been able to achieve these accomplishments because of his powerful committee posts.

"He is a member of the committees appropriations, immigration, public lands, manufacturers, military affairs, and rules.

"The way for Oregon to retain these committees and maintain Senator Holman's strong influence in the senate is to re-nominate and re-elect him."

An election will be held April 24 at 8 p. m. in the Beaverton High School to vote on the question of forming a union high district.

Consolidation plans call for Beaverton to furnish the present high school building and site for the formation of the union high school district. Districts included in the proposal are: Beaverton, Union, McKay, Kington, Barnes, Hazeldale, Cedar Mill, Bethany, McKinley, Bonny Slope, Cooper Mt., Raleigh, Sylvan, (portion lying in Washington county), Aloha-Huber, Hiteon and Garden Home.

Beaverton Hummer Receives Honorable Mention

Cooking Fats not Rationed Now

Price Administrator Chester Bowles announced Saturday that, beginning Sunday, shortening and rationed salad and cooking oils will be point free.

The point value of these fats has been four red points per pound. Lard previously had been reduced to zero points because of plentiful supplies.

Bowles said there is enough shortening and salad, and cooking oils on hand to meet all civilian demands and therefore "there is no need to require point currency as a means of controlling movement of these commodities."

Will Test Heavy Duty Scales in County

Testing of heavy duty scales in Washington and Yamhill counties is in progress at the present time and the big weights and measures truck sent into the field by the state department of agriculture will be in this territory until the end of April.

All owners of heavy duty scales are urged to notify the deputy state sealer of weights and measures, M. Clarke Webb who is in charge of the truck, of the location of their scales if they want to be sure of having it tested this season. He may be reached through the Oregon hotel in McMinnville.

The department has a record of all scales tested in recent years, but new scales may be in operation in this area or locations of old ones may have changed. In either of these instances, it is particularly important that the deputy sealer be notified of location of such heavy duty scales. Small scales are not tested with this equipment.
