Navy Air Crewman
Saves His Comrade
From Blazing Plane

A 26-year-old Navy air crewman
was awarded the Navy and Marine
Corps Medal recently for saving an
injured comrade from the blazing
wreckage of a plane loaded with four
500-pound bombs. He is Rex Beach,
aviation machinist's mate first class,
of Artesia, N. M., son of Mr. and
Mrs. J. W. Beach of Artesia.

The bomber, to which Beach was
assigned as a crew member, crashed
as it took off from Henderson Field,
Guadalcanal, the Navy Department
said in making the award. Gasoline
from the shattered tanks poured over
plane and burst into flames. Beach
realized the intense fire might touch
off the bombs at any moment.

In spite of the danger, and severe
lacerations, Beach's first concern was
for the safety of the other men. He
learned the pilot was dazed, but could
extricate himself. Beach then fought
his way through the twisted frame-
work to the gun mount where an un-
conscious gunner was pinned in the
plane.

Beach worked frantically to free
the gunner. The pilot soon recover-
ed sufficiently to help. Ten minutes
later they were able to drag the help-
less man clear of the plane.

They carried him to a nearby fox-
hole and scarcely had time to dive in
themselves before the plane's bombs
exploded.

Qualifying Examination
For West Point to be Held

Washington, D. C., April 21—Rep-
resentative James W. Mott of Oregon
has been advised by the War Depart-
ment that the First Congressional
District of Oregon will have a vacan-
cy at the United States Military Acad-
emy, West Point, New York, to be
filled in 1945.

To determine the eligible candi-
dates of the First Oregon District,
Congressman Mott has requested the
Civil Service Commission to hold a
preliminary qualifying examination in
that district on July 29, 1944. The
first district embraces Washington
county.

The qualifying examination is open
to all candidates from the First Ore-
gon District within the eligible age,
including those who are serving with
the armed forces. Boys serving in the
Army, Navy, Marine Corps, and Coast
Guard to take the examination at
whatever place they are serving on
July 29, 1944, whether in the U. S. or
abroad.

Notified Congressman James W. Mott
U. S. House of Representatives, Wash-
ington, D. C. in writing not later than
June 1st, if desiring to take this ex-
amination.

Local Man Buys
Registered Jerseys

Three registered Jersey cows have
been purchased by Fred Grabhorn of
Beaverton from Mrs. D. S. Hiatt,
Ralph E. Hiatt, and Warren Sahnov.
The animals are: Melaine Fritzie
Baroness 1435163, Faulata Oxford
Carrie 1419672 and Betty Oxford Polly
1124577 respectively.

The average total earnings, includ-
ing war risk payments, on Liberty
ships for offshore voyages were \$244.50
per month for ordinary seamen and
\$773 for masters, exclusive of food
and lodging, a recent survey by the
Maritime War Emergency Board
shows. Under a ruling recently issued
by the board, the average will be
slightly lower, but the pay on voy-
ages to actual combat will be higher.

Submarines do not ordinarily carry
chaplains, but a Navy chaplain travel-
ing on a submarine on his way to
a new station was asked by the crew
to hold a service—beneath the sea,
"a thousand miles from anywhere,"
the Navy Department announced.
"I have never been or felt so close to
my listeners," the chaplain said. "And
I was certainly impressed by the sin-
cere desire of these men to carry their
worship of God with them through
the battles of this war, even under
the sea."

RATION BOOK REMINDER

Cut this out and keep it in your
purse or billfold.

ADVANCE PORK RATION—
QPA has validated these 216 meat
points for advance use in purchase of
pork on the farm only: Last 96
brown points in book No. 3 and red
stamps numbered "8" and lettered
"A" through "M" in book No. 4 (each
red stamp good for 10 points, regard-
less of the point value printed on
them).

MEATS—FATS— Book 4
Red Stamps A8 through M8 are
good indefinitely. Waste kitchen fats
exchanged for two points and four
cents a pound.

Red Stamps N8, P8, and Q8 valid
on April 23.

PROCESSED FRUITS—Vegetables
Blue Stamps A8 through K8 are
good indefinitely.

Blue Stamps L8, M8, N8, P8, and Q8
valid May 1.

SUGAR—
Stamp No. 30 in book No. 4 valid
indefinitely for five pounds.

Stamp No. 31 will become valid
April 1 indefinitely.

Stamp No. 31 valid indefinitely.

For canning only: Sugar Stamp
40 valid for 5 pounds through Feb.
28, 1945. Apply to local boards on
Form R-323 for remainder (20 lbs.
max. per person) affixing spare stamp
\$7 for each person, (after March 23).

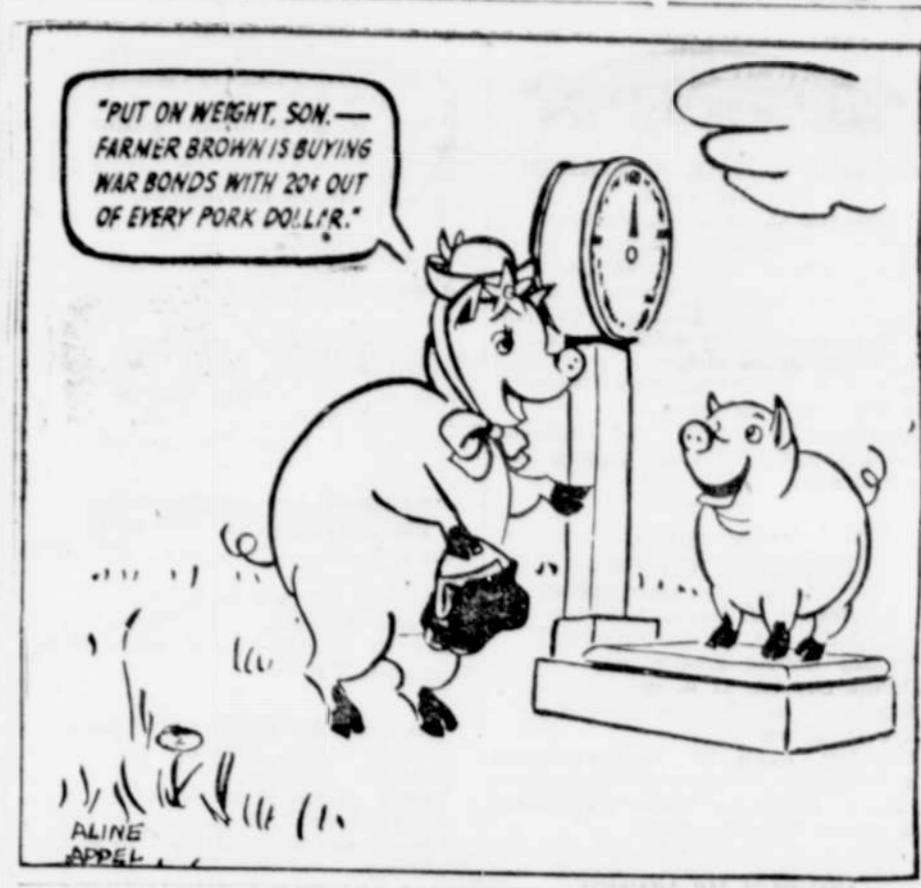
