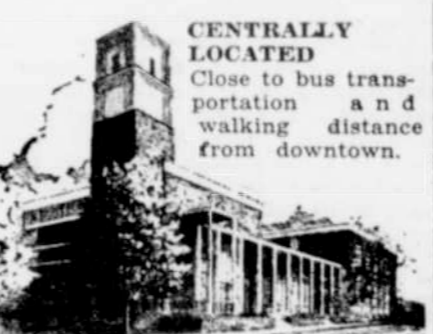

**Traffic Accidents  
 Increase in March**

Traffic accidents took a toll of 19  
 lives in Oregon during the month of  
 March, an increase of 12 percent over  
 the toll of 17 for the same month last  
 year, according to an announcement  
 from the safety division of the secre-  
 tary of state's office today.

For the first quarter of 1944, traffic  
 claimed 59 lives, an increase of 30  
 percent over the toll for the same  
 period of 1943.

The strong increase in traffic  
 deaths this year is evidence of the  
 need for greater care on the part of  
 drivers and pedestrians, according to  
 the safety division.

Accidents at grade crossings ac-  
 counted for five of the 19 traffic  
 deaths during March. With a strong  
 increase in grade crossing deaths this  
 year, the safety division urged drivers  
 to observe stop signs at grade  
 crossings and to allow approaching  
 trains to pass before proceeding  
 across the tracks. Most of the grade  
 crossing accidents this year involve  
 vehicles struck by the engine of the  
 approaching train as the driver at-  
 tempted to cross the tracks ahead of  
 the oncoming train.

Of the 19 fatalities in March, eleven  
 were in urban areas.

**Soil Building to Figure  
 Larger in Oregon Crop Plan**

Oregon farmers intend to make ex-  
 tensive use of soil building and con-  
 servation aids in meeting 1944 pro-  
 duction goals, according to reports  
 from county and community AAA  
 committeemen and indications from  
 farm plan sheets completed for more  
 than 30,000 Oregon farms.

AAA payments this year are being  
 made exclusively for soil building  
 practices, but farmers who partici-  
 pate in the 1944 program will be able  
 to receive payment for all practices  
 performed, points out John Shepherd  
 of Scio, member of the state AAA  
 committee.

Application of lime and phosphate  
 under the program will be limited  
 only by the amount of materials  
 available in the state, Shepherd said.  
 Lime plants are somewhat behind on  
 orders and the demand for phos-  
 phate generally is ahead of deliveries  
 of AAA phosphate under the conser-  
 vation materials program. Supplies  
 of boron, sulfur and gypsum are more  
 plentiful, and increased use of these  
 materials is indicated.

More use of weed control practices  
 is expected under the 1944 program  
 than ever before. Interest is also  
 high in range and pasture improve-  
 ment practices, including seeding,  
 stock water developments, pasture  
 clearing and destructive plant control.

 ing stray weed stock you do not  
 broadcast weed seed.
