Victory Garden Notes

Continued rainy weather gave Victory gardeners who had not put in their garden an opportunity to grow some of the vegetables which might otherwise have not been profitable. Successful plantings of carrots, parsnips, cabbage plants, broccoli, kale and cauliflower are recommended.

It will soon be time to transplant tomatoes, lettuce and other plants which have been started in a hot-house.

New gardeners quite often set plants too deep. The soil should be firmed lightly about the roots instead of tightly packed on top. Transplants should not be exposed to the sun.

Gardeners should check their young vegetable plants, strawberries and others so that when the spittle bugs begin to appear they may be dusted. Rotenone dust is very successful for this purpose. It may be placed in a cheesecloth bag and shaken over the plants. Hydrate lime and nicotine dust may be used if rotenone is not available.

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Stranded Airmen May Trade Trinkets for Food-Shelter

A string of colorful beads, a plug of tobacco, or a hand mirror might have helped many a Yank in some foreign battle area, the U. S. Army Air Forces say. These are some of the items contained in barter kits issued to army airmen—kits that may be useful in event of a forced landing in strange primitive territories.

The downed flyer may use these trinkets to trade or bargain for food, lodging, transportation and guidance. Also included in the small lightweight kits are buttons, lipstick, needles, safety pins, fishing hooks, costume jewelry, razor blades, matches and ribbons.

To take into consideration every possible fate that might befall a fighting airman and to equip him with the most compact necessities is a tremendous job, the air forces say, and the provision of the barter kit may be as important as providing him with a parachute, food rations, medical kits and other safety or protective equipment.

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Dan Harmon for U. S. Congress



Dan Harmon, republican candidate for Congress, has this week visited Beaverton, Tigard, and other parts of Washington County in the interest of his campaign to unseat Congressman Mot.

TOTAL CONSCRIPTION!

YOUR QUESTIONS ANSWERED
Part I: National Operations

4. What Does 'Conscription of Men' Mean?
All effectives, male and female, between the ages of 18 and 65, shall be conscripted by the Government for national service.
The demands of the war and the post-war reorganization of society will require that people be assigned to socially necessary work. This will demand the conscription of men and women as much as the war of the battlefields.
All able citizens will thus be in the direct service of the nation whether they are in the armed forces or in civilian activity. Those in the Armed Forces will be under command of the Armed Forces as now. Those in manufacturing and other civilian services will be under the direction of the technological command in which they serve.
It is to be noted here that this is not merely a labor conscription program. Technocracy is opposed to the conscription of Labor alone. This program includes manpower, but only one phase.

5. What Does 'Conscription of Materiel' Mean?
All of the equipment and physical facilities of production, transportation, communication, and mining will be placed under national direction to work unhampered in the war effort. Technocracy's design of Total Conscription therefore requires that the Governments of the United States and Canada conscript for the duration and for six months thereafter all of the equipment and physical facilities used by the nation. This includes the equipment and physical facilities of:
a. Rail, truck, bus, water and air transportation.
b. Telegraph, telephone, and radio communication.
c. Public utilities and power production and transmission.
d. The manufacturing industries.
e. The oil wells and refineries.
f. Mines and Mining operations.
The Treasury Department would issue certificates of deposit showing the equity of corporations and individuals in the property conscripted. All of the financial transactions and bookkeeping records of the corporations engaged in these activities would be "quick frozen" for the duration and they would cease to operate as private corporate enterprises engaged in producing for profit at a price. They would all become national "arsenals" of total war producing the requirements of the nation.
The materiel consists of the apparatus and supplies of an organization as distinguished from its personnel. Included in materiel are all of the manufactured supplies, foodstuffs, clothing, and raw materials necessary for carrying out any given operation or series of operations.
Under Total Conscription the title of all materiel (whether originated from agricultural, mining, manufacturing, the forest, or the sea) shall be transferred to the respective Government before it can be shipped by any common carrier—rail, truck, air, or marine.
