**French Buy pieces
To Hedge Against Franc**
MADRID.—The new millionaires of France—merchants engaged in the black market—are frantically buying up masterpieces of art at auctions in their eagerness to convert francs into articles of intrinsic value, Paris correspondents of the Spanish press report.

It was explained that Frenchmen who before the war were unable to distinguish a Corot from a colored photograph now are enthusiastic buyers and sellers at the Hotel Durot, where many French art auctions are held.

The "Annual of Public Sales," which gives the prices paid for works of art sold at public auctions, listed one of Corot's lesser pictures sold in 1943 for 1,391,000 francs. (The franc was worth \$0.23 at the time France was occupied.) The picture was last sold in 1875 for 500 francs.

A Degas sketch, which brought 2,000 francs in 1934, sold for 288,650 francs in 1943, and the same artist's portrait, which sold for 16,000 francs in 1908, brought 1,610,000 francs.

In a single day's auction during the year a total of 123 pictures were sold for a total of 55,000,000 francs. Art experts were reported making fortunes both as buyers and agents.

**Calls Pelt of Muskrat
'Sure Cure' for Asthma**

ORANGE, TEXAS.—F. J. Pavell of Orange, amateur weather forecaster, announces that he has discovered a "sure cure" for asthma—muskrat pelts.

Local cynics who scoffed when Pavell predicted last fall that a raging gulf hurricane would not hit Orange, observed that if Pavell said muskrats would cure asthma, then muskrats would.

Pavell said that sufferers from asthma would be cured if they tied muskrat pelts, fur down, to their chests. He admitted he didn't know why muskrat pelts so attached relieved suffering, but he said he knew it did because he had cured from 50 to 75 persons.

Churchill Willed \$80,000

Of Banker's \$9,818,000
LONDON.—Henry Strakosch, banker-economist and a British knight, who died last October, bequeathed Prime Minister Churchill \$80,000 as "a token of friendship and gratitude for his and his wife's great kindness and hospitality," it was disclosed. The estate, valued at about \$9,818,000, was one of the largest disclosed by recent death records. Jan Christiaan Smuts, prime minister of South Africa, was left \$40,000, and Minister of Information Brendan Bracken was bequeathed \$10,000.

**Navy Gunner Plays Possum
And Lures Jap to Disaster**

How a gunner on a Navy patrol plane lured a reluctant Japanese fighter pilot within range of a telling burst of gunfire was disclosed recently by the Navy Department in awarding the Air Medal to Martin J. Battuello, 23-year-old aviation machinist's mate first class, of Calumet, Michigan.

The one-man drama was staged during a dangerously low-level bombing attack on enemy ships in Kiska Harbor. Six Zeros swarmed around the plane as the pilot pulled out of a bombing run.

One Jap in particular selected Battuello's position at the waist gun as his target. He swooped in several times, but always pulled away at a distance which showed considerable respect for the ability of the Navy air crewman. It was obvious the Jap did not desire to get too close to the Navy guns. Battuello decided to resort to theatrics.

The Jap made another pass, firing a long burst. Suddenly, Battuello's guns were silent and the Jap saw the gunner sprawl across his weapon. Eagerly the enemy pulled up and sped into action for another run—this time to be unchallenged.

With the mid-section of the Navy plane in his sight, he roared in boldly. He was saving his fire for a sure, deadly burst. The distance closed rapidly. Battuello lay motionless across his guns.

Then, with split-second timing, Battuello sprang to life. His audience was too startled to fire as Battuello seized his guns and blasted point-blank at the Zero. There was a big puff of smoke and the Zero slipped off on one wing, out of control. Battuello was unable to see all of the fiery plunge, but it was obvious his show had paid tremendous box office returns.

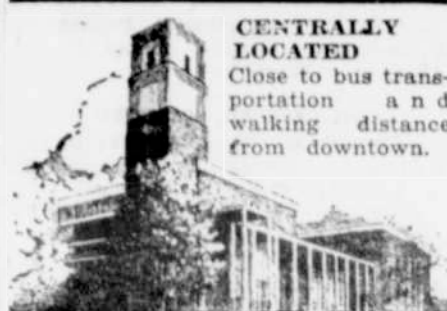
