T. H. Tongue III Now Located in Portland

It has recently been announced by Edwin D. Hicks, Portland attorney, that Mr. Thomas H. Tongue, III, is now associated with him in the practice of law. Mr. Tongue was born in Hillsboro, Oregon, where his father, his uncle, E. B. Tongue, now deceased and his grandfather, maintained a law office for 75 years. He attended the University of Oregon, where he was student body president, and attended also the University of Oregon Law School, from which he graduated at the head of his class.

Like Mr. Hicks, he then won a Sterling Fellowship to the Yale Law School, one of 7 such fellowships awarded throughout the United States, where he studied administrative law and labor law, and received the degree of Doctor of the Science of Jurisprudence.

Upon leaving Yale, Mr. Tongue was appointed as attorney for the Bureau of Municipal Research of the University of Oregon and The League of Oregon Cities, where he codified the ordinances for several cities, including Salem and Hillsboro, and also was engaged in the drafting of model ordinances and City Charters.

He then spent a year in Washington, D. C., as an attorney for the Wage and Hour Division, United States Department of Labor, following which he was stationed in Seattle as attorney in charge of litigation for the Division in Oregon and Washington.

Upon the request of his former law school Dean, Wayne L. Morse, then a public member of the National War Labor Board, Mr. Tongue accepted a position with the Board's West Coast Lumber Commission, which he helped to organize in September, 1942. Since that time and until recently, he has been in charge of the office of the Commission as its executive secretary.

Mr. Tongue received unanimous thanks and praise for his work by members of the Commission, both public, labor and industry, who emphasized the fact that his resignation was solely at his own request in order that he might return to the practice of law.

Mr. Tongue states that as a result of his experience with the Government, he hopes to specialize in administrative law, labor law and municipal law while at the same time being associated with Mr. Hicks in a general practice which consists basically of court litigation.

30% of County's Quota Already Sold

Bond sales at the close of the first week of the fifth war loan campaign totaled \$675,623.75, or approximately 30 per cent of Washington county's \$2,200,000 quota, according to figures released by W. C. Christensen and H. L. MacKenzie, co-chairmen of the county war finance committee. Total sales of series E bonds for the first six days of the drive were \$194,393.75, only a little over 11 per cent of the \$1,648,000 goal set by the county committee.

Sales in the current drive are running slightly ahead of the pace set in the fourth war loan campaign.

In the Beaverton district \$34,631.25 worth of bonds have been sold, 11% of their quota of \$308,000, leaving a balance of \$273,368.75 to be raised.

In the Tigard area \$11,370 worth of bonds have been sold or 5% of its quota of \$222,000, leaving a balance of \$210,630 to be sold.

"If you can't shoulder a gun . . . shoulder the cost of one," declared the co-chairmen in calling attention to the fact that achieving the county quota will require an average bond purchase of at least \$100 for every man and woman in the area. "We must all put our idle money to work as fighting dollars. We have never let our fighting men down and we must not fail in the fifth war loan drive . . . Buy more than before."

Metzler were present. The bond issue was approved.

The indifference of voters in attending school elections here can only be attributed to the confidence of people in the good judgment of the school board and the superintendent of the schools.

Cut Berry Tops Promptly If At All

Cutting off the tops of strawberry plants after harvest is recommended only when strawberry leaf spot is bad or where the strawberry crown moth is present, says O. T. McWhorter, extension horticulturist at OSC.

If tops are to be cut off, he recommends their removal with a scythe, sickle, or knife immediately following harvest, after which they can be barked to the center of the rows and burned to destroy the leaf spot disease. Delaying topping long after the end of harvest has resulted in sharply decreased yields the next season, McWhorter says.

Some growers follow the practice of leaving one plant in every eight to serve as trap plants for moth eggs. After the eggs are destroyed, these plants are then destroyed.
