Monte Carlo Ends Three-Year Spree

Germans Install Rationing at Gambling Center.

MADRID.—The wild, war-boom spree at Monte Carlo is over after three years of fabulous high jinks, and curfew now sounds in the gambling center at 8 p. m.

The tiny principality was an oasis of good living until last week. Billions of francs crossed the casino's gambling tables every night. British whisky, Havana cigars, American cigarettes, whipped cream and other luxuries drained from the black markets of the Continent found their way to Monte Carlo for sale at king's ransom prices.

Apparently every European black market millionaire, grafting Quisling or loot-heavy high officer on the loose sooner or later turned up at the wide-open resort where everybody—so the word was spread throughout Hitler's Europe—could have a "prewar good time" if he had the price.

Even for more modest incomes, Monte Carlo offered the luxury of no rationing. There were plenty of new rich in the new order eager to revel in the 24 hour bacchanale.

Last week the war cracked down on Monte Carlo. The Germans, reportedly getting a fat cut from casino profits, finally decided to sacrifice it lest the Nazi high command find this soft spot tolerated and protected so close to the Allied bases in Corsica.

Prince Louis of Monaco and his daughter, Princess Charlotte, were told by their ministers of state, who got their orders from the Germans, that rationing similar to that in force in France must begin.

Moreover, the orders specified that 5,000 aliens living in Monaco—Germans excepted, naturally—must get out. The 5,000 were sent packing, together with thousands of casual tourists.

1,381,681 Felonies in United States During '43

WASHINGTON.—American lawbreakers committed a major crime every 22.8 seconds in 1943 for an estimated total of 1,381,681 felonies, Director J. Edgar Hoover of the Federal Bureau of Investigation reported.

Hoover said in his annual crime report that each 24 hour period brought reports of 27 criminal homicides, 29 rapes, 138 other felonious assaults, 124 robberies, 745 burglaries, 514 automobile thefts and 2,209 miscellaneous larcenies.

Reports from 318 major cities, Hoover said, indicated that robberies and larcenies were on the down trend, while automobile thefts, burglaries and rape increased. He noted particularly the rise in rape cases—21.9 per cent over the 1939-'41 average—and emphasized that boys and girls 18 to 21 years old comprised the largest single age group of criminal offenders.

Total Deaths in Battle Estimated at 6,000,000

NEW YORK.—Statisticians of the Metropolitan Life Insurance company estimated that about 6,000,000 men have died in battle in this war, as compared with 7,500,000 in the last war.

The aggregate loss to the United States, included deaths among the wounded and probable deaths among those listed as missing, was placed by the statisticians at 43,000 at the end of 1943, or 9,000 less than in 1917 and 1918.

"About three-fourths of the losses in the present war are accounted for by German and Russian dead," the experts said. "For each of these countries, the toll is upward of 2,000,000 and both have almost certainly suffered more than in the last war. With the exception of Japan and possibly also of Rumania and Greece, the battle deaths of other countries in the present war remain well below those of the First World war."

Uncover Booby Trap Set By Washington's Army

PHILADELPHIA.—A "booby trap" set by George Washington's army in 1777 was uncovered by army engineers dredging the Delaware river.

The trap, called a "stockade" was found off the New Jersey shore below Hog island. It was a wooden crib, 30 feet long and 20 feet wide, weighted down with boulders and fitted with long iron spikes facing downstream just below the surface. The spikes were intended to pierce the hulls of wooden ships.

The story shows, however, that a traitor showed the British how to avoid the stockade—and they sailed up the Delaware to capture Philadelphia.

6 of Kin Die in War, Woman Carries On

ATLANTA, GA.—Mrs. Helen Conner reported to her riveting school on schedule with another reason—the sixth—for doing her part in the war effort.

She was notified that a brother, Lieut. Nick Zadorkin, had been killed in Burma. He is the sixth member of her immediate family to die in this war.

Yank Sergeant Relates How Gum Saved Bomber

ATLANTIC CITY, N. J.—A pack of chewing gum saved the day on a B-26 medium bomber in the Mediterranean theater, Tech. Sgt. Wayne E. Armstrong, 20, of Mahomet, Ill., recalled.

Sergeant Armstrong, now at the army air forces redistribution station No. 1, being tested for a new assignment, told this story:

"We had struck a road junction above Salerno when flak punctured a hydraulic line controlling the lowering of the landing gear. We had to belly-land that day. Fortunately no one was hurt.

"The next time the hydraulic line was struck by flak, I collected chewing gum from the crew and stuck it on a piece of gauze. I stuck the pad on the hole, and tightened a tourniquet over it. Holding the tourniquet with one hand, I held pliers over the puncture with the other.

"The puncture broke loose after we had landed at our African base, but we were on the ground then, so we didn't have to worry."

Malformed Teeth Linked To Allergies by Dentist

CHICAGO.—Allergies may be responsible for malformations of human teeth and jaws, Dr. Walter J. Straub, San Francisco, Calif., said in the Journal of the American Dental association.

"In considering the large number of orthodontic patients suffering from allergy in a group of 104 patients," he wrote, "it is evident that one of the most effective ways of reducing the incidence of dental anomalies (irregularities) may be the early detection of chronic nasal or respiratory allergy with subsequent treatment to eliminate it."

90,000 Planes British Output for War Period

LONDON.—Britain produced 90,000 planes and 83,000 tanks, armored cars and carriers from the beginning of the war through the end of 1943, Production Minister Lyttelton told the house of commons.

Disclosing hitherto secret production figures, Lyttelton reported that British factories have built 76 per cent of the total structure weight of new aircraft delivered to the Royal Air force, while the rest of the British commonwealth contributed 6 per cent and the United States 18 per cent.

New Antilouse Powder Used to Fight Typhus

ALGIERS, ALGERIA.—The army's antilouse powder "DDT," applied for the first time on a mass scale to combat an epidemic, has arrested the spread of typhus in Naples, Brig. Gen. Leon Fox, Birmingham, Ala., field director of the United States typhus commission, told the Allied medical conference here.

Army's 'Wasp Wagon' Has a Wonderful Sting

CLEVELAND.—Already a veteran of three major campaigns, the army's "wasp wagon" had its first public bow. The newest mobile anti-aircraft weapon, known as the M-16, is a swift half-track vehicle carrying a cluster of four .50-caliber Browning machine guns geared together for a fire power of up to 2,000 shots a minute.

Its four-pronged turret can be operated in all directions.

Rabbit Foods

Hit and miss feeding methods won't do in rabbitkeeping. It can be said generally that good quality hays — alfalfa, clover, soybean, sweet clover, and timothy—are the roughages needed, and must be supplemented more or less with grain foods—rolled barley, rolled oats, and even wheat and the grain sorghums. Cracked corn is relished. Feeding expensive grain foods and high-priced hay in wartime is not altogether practical, however.

The facts are that backyard rabbitkeepers have a very wide range in good feeding practice if care is taken to supplement the hay and grain rations with many items of table scraps, garden wastage, garden crops and roadside weeds, which are entirely acceptable as rabbit foods provided they are sweet, clean and palatable.

Use Crumbs

Make the most of every crumb and crust. Dress up your stale bread by using it in escalloped dishes, in puddings, or as French toast. For example, serve French toast just as you might serve waffles and top with a syrup or fruit sauce.

Or, serve French toast for a main dish with creamed meat or vegetables. Remember, too, that dry bread cubes can be used in escalloped dishes and dressings, but will require a little added moisture. Such cubes also brown nicely for croutons.

 Part III: National Safety and Welfare
18. Will People Have Their Freedom Restricted?

A TRULY NATIONAL Victory program will bring new obligations to the people of America and to their Governments, with national service on the one hand and social responsibility on the other. War itself, and not Total Conscription, is already responsible for restricting much of our customary freedom of movement.

Americans and Canadians surrendered certain liberties. Both coastal areas of the Continent are now actually under martial law which may be exercised at any time by the War Department and the commanding officers. One of the first measures called into effect under martial law was the compulsory dim-out on each coast. Another is the internment of Japanese nationals on the Pacific coast and their removal from the area, along with the internment of thousands of other aliens throughout the country. In Alaska and Hawaii complete martial law is enforced. Other restrictions are effected by the rationing of certain products. Americans and Canadians must surrender certain liberties for the duration of the war in order that we may retain our time by the War Department and the commanding officers. One of the measures necessary to preserve the national safety and the national welfare. These are specified in the questions which follow.
