Davies Completes Training

Childress Army Air Field, Childress, Texas, July 7.—With the news of this war's second destructive bombing of Island Japan fresh in their ears, another large class of "Hell from Heaven" men today completed eighteen weeks of intensive training to become bombardiers at this AAF Central Flying Training Command bombardier-navigation school.

Eager to peek through bombsights along with other AAF bombardiers whose marksmanship is softening up Axis defenses from Yawata to Normandy, the graduates include Henry G. Davies son of Mrs. Jenny C. Davies of Beaverton, Oregon.

The bombardier-graduate of CAAF has also been given a taste of what he may experience under combat conditions soon. As a climax to his training, he lived for a week, based high on a West Texas plateau, bunking in pup tents and underground shelters, living on concentrated rations, fusing, loading and racking his own bombs in preparation for missions.

The new bombardier-navigators are ready to join the AAF's crack precision bombing teams, key men in many future aerial assaults that await Axis strongholds till the day of surrender.

Tubes Now Unrationed

All passenger, truck, tractor and implement tubes will be removed from rationing, effective July 1, 1944, the Office of Price Administration announced last week.

This move, comes as a result of the fact that inventories and production appear adequate to meet normal needs. It will eliminate the necessity of persons applying at local War Price and Rationing Boards for tubes.

stories and other hard goods, along with an abundance of soft goods, will be available. These all will be in great demand.

I fully expect, in the decade after the War, to see close to 5,000,000 new homes built. This will naturally be a great thing for both skilled and unskilled labor and should do much to keep up activity in the cement industries, which last will also benefit from our new road-building program. Homes are currently in great demand and prices—particularly in suburban communities—are expanding rapidly. It looks very much as though we would experience a real building boom. This is likewise true of productive real estate in general. I cannot now say that the entire country will participate in a land boom, but Florida, the Southwest and California now seem headed in that direction.

Our Best Bet

After the immediate and inevitable readjustments which the end of the War will bring, businessmen should not be too much concerned with worrying over the following four years. Our real problem and task will be to determine how our coming prosperity can be extended after 1950. In the early 1950's we will begin to see signs of distress. It will be much harder then, for business to provide reasonably full employment within the limits of our free enterprise system. Furthermore, the postwar inflation which may be now worrying about may take place at that time.

We shall not always be able to depend upon Washington to maintain our property or to provide a solution to our economic problems. Beyond the postwar decade, the future depends upon the character and education of our young people and upon the intelligence and far-sighted guidance of our grandparents. Yes, I am optimistic for the next five years, but during that period we should prepare for another era of declining real estate, bond, stock and commodity prices, accompanied by general unemployment after 1950.

Royalties to go to Nat. War Fund

Bob Hope, who has travelled more than 20,000 miles to entertain service men and women and who has made extensive tours in the combat zones for USO-Camp Shows, will turn over all royalties from the sale of his forthcoming book, "I Never Left Home," has been announced by W. W. Aldrich, president of the Fund.

The National War Fund, which supported by 10,000 Community War funds throughout the country, among them the Portland - Multnomah Co. United War Chest, finances USO and USO-Camp Shows, War Prisoners Aid, United Seaman's Service and sixteen other agencies working for assistance to our Allies.

"I saw your sons and your husbands, your brothers and your sweethearts," Bob Hope has written. I saw how they worked, played, fought and lived. I saw some of them die. I saw more courage, more good humor in the face of discomfort, more love in an era of hate, and more devotion to duty than could exist under tyranny.

"Until a lot more of us realize what our men have gone through in planes and tanks, in the jungle, desert and to the beaches, it's going to be tough to talk to the men coming back. And in the case of those who aren't doing all they should, it's going to be tougher to look them in the eye."

"Dying is sometimes easier than living through it. . . . But dying is always harder than what we at home are asked to do. We can't give until it hurts, because it doesn't hurt to give money."

July Pointers

Here are July pointers for Mrs. America. The family's July budget of points to cover purchases of rationed meats and fats was enriched by the validation of X8, Y8 and Z8 in ration book four. Each of these red stamps, good for ten points, will be valid indefinitely. If there are any red stamps bearing the numeral eight in ration book four left over they still can be used. These thirty points will be all the ration currency validated for the purchase of meats and fats during July. And now for blue points. The July quota—50 blue points—is provided through the validation of W8, X8, Y8, Z8, and A5 in ration book four. Previously all stamps bearing the numeral eight on the face—from A to W—have been validated and remain good indefinitely. The numeral on the stamp is for identification only and has no connection with the value.
