Oregon Buys

Early Maturities Bonds In Sum of \$4,888,440

The participation of the state of Oregon in the Fifth war loan amounted to a purchase of \$4,888,440 as fixed by the state bond commission on recommendation of State Treasurer Leslie M. Scott, and was announced by Governor Earl Snell, chairman, L. O. Arens, member state industrial commission is the other commission member.

The bulk of bonds purchased are early maturities, according to Scott, which was deemed necessary because of the needs of the state for cash to carry on its activities such as post-war plans beneficial to returned servicemen and industrial workers no longer engaged in war plant work.

Time Extended to July 31 Short on E, F, G, Bond Sales

Washington county went "over the top" on its \$2,200,000 5th war loan quota Saturday night, the last day of the drive, when reports from the six county areas showed sales for all securities totaling \$2,533,532 or 115 per cent of the over-all goal. However, the county is still 11 per cent short of its \$871,000 quota on E bonds and the treasury department has continued the drive on E, F, and G securities until the last day of July.

As a result of the time extension all purchases of E, F and G bonds purchased on or before July 31 will count on the Washington county quota, according to H. L. MacKenzie and W. C. Christensen, county war finance committee chairman.

Beaverton area this oversubscribed its quota 124%, selling \$382,732.18 worth of bonds.

Tigard area finished their quota, 100% amounting to \$222,285.12.

Christensen and MacKenzie expressed their appreciation of the efforts of district and area chairmen, business men and women, newspapers and others urged that efforts be continued through July 31.

Youngsters Depended on To Harvest Cane Berries

On the shoulders of several thousand boys and girls rests the major responsibility for harvesting Oregon's big crop of cane berries again this year, according to the state farm labor office in the O. S. C. extension service.

The neat rows of red and black raspberries, loganberries, boysenberries, youngberries, blackberries and gooseberries are well adapted to the use of youngsters as pickers. A majority of the pickers last year were boys and girls, and in some areas it was estimated that about three-fourth of them were youngsters. At least as many will be needed this year.

Approximately 10,000 placements were made in the cane berry fields last year, and the farm labor office estimates that it has records on only about 40 per cent of those who actually worked in the fields.

Letter From France

Continued from last week

Don't worry about me too much. Last night when planes were overhead and guns all around us were shooting at them, I was a bit worried about flak falling thru the surgery tent but none even hit us. Otherwise the Jerrys are exceedingly good about respecting the Red Cross and as yet haven't hit any hospitals. There is a story going around that they told one of our hospitals to move back, that it was too far forward and too near other military targets. The hospital didn't move but rather blackened out more and dug more trenches. In 24 hours Jerry took a few shots at it and forced them back.

The best way of censoring mail is to hold it, and we knew they were going to do that, and I think I warned you of it. Now that the invasion is well underway, service will resume. The Germans won't give up till the Allies reach their very door steps, the moral of the German prisoners is excellent, and as yet there is a lot of tough fighting ahead. The Germans think we will quit in a few months—more than we think they will. There has been a lot of queer stuff handed out about the Heineins which isn't true. Although there seems to be none or few civilian cars here, the people are as well nourished as the English and have as many fine looking cattle and horses. Some of the horses are beautiful, not the heavy draft horses of the English, but riding animals. French kids come around for ones wash just like in Africa, and beg gum and candy like all kids do. The biggest difference between here and England, is that here there are no young adults whatsoever. Apparently they have them all dragged off to German labor battalions or the armed forces. So much of the countryside here is flooded, with a foot or so of water, that I wonder if Jerry didn't do that to make landing difficult for us.

Besides our own troops, we are now getting quite a good many German soldiers to fix up. It's most interesting to go thru their letters, etc., and look at pictures from home, little clippings they carry, and the souvenirs they have. Mostly they won't talk and are arrogant, but appreciative for our efforts. This morning we had a 17 year old boy from Sudetan, who had only had 8 months service, and another fellow with 10 years service. The latter really looked tough and good for nothing. A lot of the P. O. W. have been of Satellite troops. I must get a couple of hours sleep before midnight. Gee but its tough to get up at 11:30 or so, after maybe 5 hours sleep each day for a week and go to work. It's cold at night too, which adds to the difficulty. But Jerry has always awakened me so far, and I reckon he won't let me down tonight. Its best to be working when there is so much noise one can't sleep anyway.

Three I's Of Success

Babson Discusses The C. E. D. Group

Babson Park, Mass., July 14—Watches without springs, motors without gas, or locks without keys are of little use. This is the situation today with the Committee on Economic Development and most committees which are studying post-war employment plans. It also explains one trouble with our schools and colleges. The committees and colleges are neglecting the spiritual urge which the Prophet Isaiah wrote about in the first three verses of his Chapter 31.

What Churches Need

Springs without machines, gas without motors and keys without locks are, likewise, of little use. This is the situation today with most churches and preachers. They fail to emphasize the scientific basis for their teachings and also fail to apply spiritual power to practical everyday life. Any religion which does not express itself in right living and social relations is of little use.

The postwar planning committees and present-day educational and religious institutions need to recognize both the importance of spiritual power and just social relations. To continue to ignore such will certainly result in 10,000,000 to 15,000,000 unemployed in the U. S. after the short postwar boom is over.

Material Power Not Enough

Land, labor and capital are material; while integrity, initiative and inspiration are spiritual powers. They may either be inherited or acquired; but at all hazards they must be recognized in successful planning. This applies to national planning and to the planning of our own personal lives as individuals.

Even land, labor and capital can be used to destroy or to construct, according to the integrity, initiative and inspiration of those who have the land, labor and capital. Hence, I call these three spiritual powers the "Three I's Of Success." I have in mind both individual and national success.

Spiritual vs Radio Waves

When discussing the above with industrialists and labor leaders, they agree with my statements; but they come back to me as follows:—"How can this spiritual power—or God's Rays as you call it—be developed and harnessed? It is not enough; for preachers, priests, and rabbis to talk about it; let them show us how to get it and use it." It is probably true that we have generalized too much and too long about spiritual power. The time has come to be practical.

C. F. Kettering—Vice President of Research of General Motors—once brought to my attention that electricity was talked about as far back as 2,500 years ago. It was in 600 B. C. that a Greek philosopher, Thales of Miletus, found that by rubbing amber he could develop a force to pick up straws. Even 300 years ago experiments were made by William Gilbert in England and Von Guericke in Germany which caused electricity to
