Plans Approved For Rooms

The school district board of school district 48, has been notified by the Federal Government that their preliminary Application for assistance in constructing additional class rooms to the Beaverton grade school building has been approved.

The public works administration has requested that a formal application be forwarded as soon as possible. This application to request the following construction program:

Five additional class rooms. The cafeteria as planned in the original drawings to be constructed, but divided into two class rooms to take the place of the two proposed rooms on the south end of the new wing. The two south rooms on the original drawings to be eliminated.

If the federal government accepts the formal application 50% of the construction cost will be provided from federal funds under the Latham act. The architects have estimated the total cost of the rooms and equipment at \$60,000. \$30,000 to be provided by the local district.

At the end of last year seventeen teachers were employed in the grade school with only eleven standard class rooms. Additional space was provided by using the shower rooms, and dividing two other rooms into sub-standard temporary rooms. The library and cafeteria were also eliminated to take care of the increased enrollment.

A Letter From Italy

Still in Italy, July 9, 1944

Dear Mother, Dad and All:

Well, once more I find myself with a few more minutes so I will take typewriter in hand and attempt to write a few lines, that is if my typing is not too terribly mistake-ridden.

This will necessarily be a short note of not much interest for the simple fact that there is not anything new to write about at all.

About the only bit of news that I have at this time is the fact that yesterday I was promoted to the rank of Staff Sergeant. That means that I can add another stripe beneath the three that I have been wearing for the past two years, and that each payday hereafter I can collect one hundred and twenty dollars which is the amount the new rating pays per month overseas. Had I not been in the hospital for the past five months I would have made the raise about last January, but I had to return to duty before I could be promoted. Three years in the army and a staff sergeant's rating may not sound like so much, but this is the infantry and as you no doubt know there are no rapid fire promotions, no glamour and no publicity. One just keeps plugging along, more or less in a rut, but nevertheless it is the rut that will eventually lead to victory, but without the lowly "dogface" in his lowlier position among soldiers, it just couldn't be done. We know that even if nobody else does, and that is why another stripe on the arm means more to us than another bar on the shoulder means to an officer in another branch of the service.

My foot is still giving me a lot of unpleasant moments and is making it hard for me to maintain the physical standards set by the outfit. It is just possible that, if the condition of the foot does not return to normal before too much longer, I may have to leave the outfit and take some kind of duty that is less strenuous, but of course that is for the doctor to decide and he is keeping me under observation these days to see how I am coming along.

I had a nice long letter from Myrn the other day and she enclosed a picture of the little lady and also one of herself and John. The kid looks cute enough, but I can't figure out where she acquired all the hair she has. The picture was taken when she was four weeks old and already she looks as if she needs a haircut.

It may seem as if I am doing a lot of rambling, but I can write and on using a typewriter. I guess I am practicing more than anything else. However I will say good bye for now and ask you to give my love to Grandma and Ma and say hello to anybody that is around that I know.

Garden Home Cannery News

The Cannery, at Progress, Oregon, is now running on the schedule that will be maintained until further notice. Patrons who are availing themselves of this easy way to handle their canning needs, approve of the light airy surroundings, the efficient way in which the processing is handled and the fact that there are no sticky floors to wipe up afterwards, hot jars to handle, and other detriments to one's peace and happiness on a hot day. And the men seem to enjoy the preparation of food for the cans as well as the women—and undoubtedly appreciate the fact that canning day no longer means a hot kitchen at home and sketchy meals served by a tired wife.

If desired, preparation will be done by the Cannery, at the lowest possible cost, which is added to the cost of canning, which is as follows: 7c for No. 2 can; 8c for No. 2 1/2 can.

Pin this schedule up in your kitchen, in order that you may know when to plan your canning. The Cannery is open on Mondays, Wednesdays and Fridays, from 8:30 to 3 (that is, produce must be in the cans by that time in the afternoon.) On Tuesdays and Thursdays the Cannery is open from 2 to 8—which means that produce must be in the cans by 8, Call Mrs. Ringsmyer, CH. 1354, evenings, for reservations.

Half-Year Review

Babson Says War Boom Is Over

Babson Park, Mass. July 21—Business volume has been maintained at such a high level since Pearl Harbor that it is hard for some to realize that there can be any slowing up. However, the past six months witnessed the beginning of the end of our current war boom. As we enter the third quarter the trend will continue downward. From this point on business will have to adjust itself to quite different conditions—with a gradual resumption of more normal activities.

The Stock Market

During the past six months stock market averages of 30 industrials and 20 rails have risen from 86.04 in January to 92.69 in June. This is a rise of 7.7%. All things considered, the market has acted well during the first half of the year. Our taxes on capital gains and the double taxation on corporate dividends continue to be distinct drawbacks. London investors have no capital gains tax to contend with. Hence, the prices of English stocks are outpacing U. S. securities.

I have been bullish on stocks during the past six months and I now continue so. The coming third quarter is especially apt to show a rise in view of the Presidential Campaign. It may be odd for me to forecast a decline in the volume of business and at the same time to expect a rise in security prices; but the relief which investors are experiencing over the War's progress together with the constructive oratory of Dewey, Bricker and other Republicans is being reflected in the stock market.

Wages

In spite of controls, wages have risen a little more during the past six months. Union leaders have worked hard for pay increases and

Hereafter no delivery of firewood or coal can be made by a dealer to a consumer until the consumer furnishes the dealer with a signed statement of this annual fuel needs, etc., according to OPA orders.

This order is effective July 20. Dealers have these forms on hand.

Necessary to Schedule Sprinkling

Water users in the Beaverton district have been notified that due to water usage in excess of the supply, sprinkling and irrigation privileges must be curtailed. All sprinkling must be discontinued July 24, beginning then the following schedule for sprinkling will be observed: North of S. P. tracks—Mondays and Thursdays; S. of S. P. tracks—East of Watson St., Tuesdays and Fridays. South of S. P. tracks West of Watson St.—Wednesdays and Saturdays. No sprinkling on Sundays.

Building Permits Required

As a result of recent action by the City Council, building permits will be required of all persons desiring to construct or remodel buildings of any description within the City.

Electrical and plumbing work must be covered by permits and all such work is subject to inspection by Supt. F. H. Goyt, who has been appointed by the Council to the position of Building Inspector.
