6th War Loan Starts
November 11, 1944

It has been announced that the sixth war loan will begin Armistice day, November 11, and will run through Pearl Harbor day, December 7, it was learned Tuesday.

If the war in Europe is over by November 11, the sixth drive will be held just the same, but under the new name of "Victory loan."

If the war continues the goal may be even higher than the \$16,000,000 goal of the fifth loan, which was over subscribed by nearly \$4 billion.

County Nearing E Bond Quota

E bond sales for Washington county are still \$11,000 shy of the E quota of \$27,000 in the 5th war loan, according to Co-Chairmen W. C. Christensen and H. L. MacKenzie of the county war finance committee. However, with the time extended to July 31, they hope to reach the quota and maintain the county record for surpassing or making its quotas in all previous war loan drives.

Over-all sales in the 5th war loan up to Monday amounted to \$2,746,587 which makes in excess of 126% of quota.

More Than 160 Pints Blood Given

County residents showed their appreciation of the increased need for blood plasma to meet the increasing offensive activities of the allies in all parts of the world by turning out in greater numbers for the visit to the Red Cross "bloodmobile" at Hillsboro Friday at the Masonic temple.

Blood donations here Friday amounted to 160 pints with from 75 to 100 being turned away, some of whom were already registered. Most of those turned away were signed up to return at the next visit of the "bloodmobile" August 18. The capacity of the unit is limited to 160 pints.

Four "Gallon club" members were added, bringing the total for the county to eight.

School Fund Apportioned

Rex Putnam, superintendent of public instruction, has announced an apportionment of the \$5 million school support fund to counties, which will lower property taxes in the various districts.

This apportionment was made on the basis of actual pupil-days of attendance in each county during the 1943-44 school year.

About half the fund will be disbursed in December.

Washington county schools have been apportioned over \$200,000 of state school support funds for the 1944-45 fiscal year.

In Washington county apportionments to High Schools in the east end of the county include Tigard, \$6,429.25; Non high school districts share is \$11,414.91.

Beaverton garde and high school will receive \$14,371.80.

Amounts apportioned to other school districts is as follows: Tigard \$8,060.14; Tualatin grade, \$5,876.37; Tualatin high, \$1,133.09; Reedville \$2,947.41; Hazeldale \$1,823.20; Witch Hazel \$1,751.04; Garden Home, \$3,364.59; Cooper Mt. \$898.07; Metzger \$3,945.39; Aloha-Huber, \$5,771.25; Hiteon \$966.65.

The apportionment totals \$206,995.09 includes \$600 held over from last year based on a total days attendance of 1,211,915.

Multnomah county will receive \$1,634,241.

Don't Delay Postwar Plans

Babson Optimistic on
On Business and Politics

Babson Park, Mass., July 28—In most of its phases, American business has expanded and profited during the War. Many plants have been greatly enlarged while much corporate debt has been eliminated. Labor has profited from increased wages. This in turn has helped retail merchants. Most individuals also will come through the War in fair financial shape.

In the immediate postwar era, business has even greater possibilities. There should be a tremendous demand for goods and services heretofore unavailable. With individuals holding the largest amount of savings in the history of the country, there should be plenty of customers. However, business must produce the goods and create employment opportunities. This can be done but necessitates planning now with the hearty co-operation of employers, labor leaders and Government.

Uncertainties to Overcome

Manufacturers must decide what new products they must make to take the place of their present war output. Most of them should arrange for the sale or junking of obsolete equipment and the purchase of new machinery. They should get rid of surplus inventories no longer needed. They should now study markets for their own products and figure costs and prices. It different types of workers are to be employed, classes for their instruction should now be planned. Tentative production schedules should now be whipped into shape.

Many uncertainties affecting all businessmen await government action. Such action will include the okaying of definite plans for reconversion, postwar taxation and whether or not controls will continue in effect after the War on materials, prices and labor. Furthermore, only the Government can act on the dis-
