Oregon War Chest Campaign Starts Oct. 2

Oregon War Chest campaign for 1944 in Washington county will get under way October 2, according to preliminary plans and organization announced this week by Thomas H. Bailey of Hillsboro, county chairman. Although the quota for this area has not been received, Bailey declared that it would be approximately the same as the \$30,500 goal last year.

The county will be divided into 10 districts with an area chairman over each, Bailey declared. District lines will be based on school districts in order to avoid any overlap or confusion. Each area will be assigned a quota for the month long campaign.

County committee as announced by Bailey for the coming drive is as follows: Bailey, chairman; O. B. Gates, vice-chairman; Mrs. Zola F. Morgan, secretary-treasurer, all of Hillsboro.

Others from east end of county include Mrs. L. Schaltenbrand, Tigard, route 3; Mrs. George Eisenhauer, route 1, Beaverton; C. J. Stickney, Aloha; Leonard Adams, Beaverton; Art Mason, Tigard; H. F. Moore of West Slope.

Members of the Oregon War Chest corporation include Bailey, Gates, Paldanius and Moore.

Grange Endorses Japanese Barrier Plan

A resolution was adopted by state grange masters from Oregon, Washington, California, Idaho and Montana Saturday and Sunday in Portland requesting the federal government to keep all Japanese now in this military area, in confinement and that no Japanese be permitted to return to the west coast after this war.

The resolution was aimed at the War Relocation authority for "conducting a propaganda campaign to arouse public sympathy for persons of Japanese extraction" it further charges that the Japanese have failed to assimilate themselves and never can be assimilated in American community life.

The stamps—G5, H5, J5, K5, and L5—will be good indefinitely.

It has been the policy of OPA to validate five blue stamps on the first day of each calendar month.

A Letter From France

Mrs. N. Waters has received a very interesting letter from her son John, who is now in France. On August 9 he writes:

"It's another nice day here in France, plenty warm in the afternoon. Just had coffee and doughnuts. A Red Cross clubmobile came in with three Red Cross women and all the doughnuts we could eat. They were super-duper. It seemed good to see American women out here.

"We have moved again since I last wrote you. We are in an old orchard which shows an awful lot of previous battle. The trees are all shot to pieces, scarred with machine gun bullets and shrapnel. There is bomb craters and fox holes all over the place and a few fields over from ours. There is still some German dead lying dead on top of the ground. German arms and ammunition scattered all over the place. This has been the scene of a terrific battle and what a battle it must have been!

How I miss the Beaverton Enterprise and the news of our town!

It's another warm day—yesterday was cool and cloudy, saw a USO show in the field. Just something to kill time. We aren't doing much nowadays and the time drags. About the only thing of interest to us during the day is making just after show.

Following The Crowd

Babson Advises Against It

Babson Park, Mass., August 25—I think it can statistically be proven that the public is usually wrong in its forecasting of real estate, commodity and investment problems. Certainly, those who "follow the crowd" lose money in the end, while those who do the opposite usually make money. Furthermore, those who act differently from the "crowd" perform a real service and are entitled to a good profit for their independence and courage. Let me this week give three illustrations.

Filling Stations
Those who drive about the country today must be impressed by the number of vacant filling stations. Not only are these found in the woods, but also in the active suburbs of our cities. I am sure that every one of the thousand or more communities where my column is read has these vacant filling stations. In most cases, the pumps have either been removed or boarded up. They may be closed for lack of business or because the owner has gone into the Service or important war work.

Of course it is self-evident that with cars on the road reduced by millions and with the gasoline and tire restrictions, fewer filling stations can profitably exist today than was the case before the War. On the other hand, it seems only common sense that most of these closed filling stations will open up again after the War. They then may have just as good, and perhaps better, business. Many of these filling stations are for sale at a distinct discount from their pre-war prices; they appear to me to be one of the very best bargains available today. The "crowd" are neglecting them and act as if the War would last forever, but there will be a few wise persons who will soon be.
