Resolution

Believing that the time has come in National affairs that Employer Organizations should express publicly as an "organization" their viewpoints in the national scene, the Directors, by this resolution, refer the membership of the Associated Employers of Oregon, Inc., a referendum vote on the following:

WHEREAS: The Republican platform, adopted by the National Republican Convention recently held in Chicago, has clearly outlined a constructive policy of security for business and industry, for agriculture and for labor, that this platform deserves the study and careful consideration of the citizens of Oregon;

THAT business, industry, labor and the farmer must choose at the polls in November of 1944 which way the Ship of Nation shall sail;

THAT a National publication "News Week", in a recent issue, stated that the State of Oregon was a doubtful state as to which way the voters would swing for either ticket in the 1944 general election;

THAT the issue as the Directors see it in the National Presidential Campaign of 1944 is either the continuation of the "law of directive" as advanced by the candidates of the Democratic Party, or the return to the "law of Constitutional government" as advanced by the candidates of the Republican Party.

NOW, therefore, be it resolved: That the Associated Employers of Oregon, Incorporated, recommend to the organization's membership the Association's endorsement of the candidacy of the Republican nominee, the Honorable Thomas E. Dewey of New York for the Presidency of the United States of America, and the Honorable John W. Bricker of Ohio, for the candidacy of Vice-president of the United States of America.
