Spare stamp 25 in book No. 4 valid Sept. 3 thru Oct. 21 for lamb.

Waste kitchen fats exchanged for two points and four cents a pound.

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BLUE TOKENS to be discontinued October 1.

Book 4—Blue stamps A8 through L5 valid indefinitely.

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Stamps No. 30, 31, 32 and 33 in book 4 valid indefinitely for five pounds.

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SHOES—Loose Stamps Invalid

Book 3—Airplane stamps No's. 1 and 2, indefinitely for one pair.

FUEL OIL—

Period 4-5 coupons valid thru Aug. 31, 1945. New 1 coupon valid now.
