SCRAP TO JAPS

For years the Republicans fought to place an embargo on scrap iron to Japan. On January 3, 1939, Rep. Fred Crawford, (R. Mich.) introduced a bill in Congress to stop the sale of scrap iron, pig iron, and steel scrap to that country. Not until 1941 did the administration stop the sale of scrap. This was too late to prevent the building of the Jap war machine.

In the first 8 years of the New Deal, over 10,000,000 tons of scrap iron went to Japan. This amount would have built 20 battleships of 45,000 tons each; 50 plane carriers of 30,000 tons each; 100 cruisers of 15,000 tons each; and still leave nearly 5,000,000 tons for planes, tanks, bombs, torpedoes, and bullets.

During the Roosevelt depression we were buying toys, novelties and crockery from the Japanese while American plants remained idle. Our plants could not compete with 25-cent-per-day Jap labor.

Do It With Dough!

"I hope we get 25 million dollars. We want all we can get. The more we get, the more we can spend. The more we spend, the better Congress we will have. The more we spend in Pennsylvania, the better State legislature we will have. It's as simple as that."

These cynical words were spoken by David J. McDonald, financial secretary of the Sidney Hillman Political Action Committee. "Get out and get the dough if you want political action to succeed," McDonald continued.

Attending College

Dorothy Kirkwood and Corrine Schappert of Beaverton, have started their work at Lewis and Clark college this week. Both of them are sophomores, and each has been awarded a scholarship for this year.

Miss Kirkwood will sing in the choir under the direction of John Stark Evans, the new head of the department of music. She will also study piano with Margaret Notz Steinmetz, an instructor in the college music department.

Roberta Pearl Smith of Metzger, has commenced her studies at Lewis and Clark college in Portland this week. She is entering as a freshman, having been graduated from Tigard high school in the spring of 1944. Her special field will be language and she is now enrolled in a Spanish class under Emma B. Mielr, assistant professor of German and Spanish.

The enrollment at Lewis and Clark college has increased more than 20 per cent over last year, and there has been a 20 per cent increase in the faculty. A new library is being built, and a pipe organ is to be installed by the first of the year.

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Bonds Negotiable

While the Government has made it possible for holders of bonds to cash them directly at banks beginning October 2, it was intended that the new system was organized solely as a convenience for those who of sheer necessity must cash bonds. It is intended to make it possible for them to hold their bonds longer because their money will be at once available upon the actual occurrence of any necessity. Some have been cashing in advance of necessity in order to have their cash in time. Their bonds henceforth will be as negotiable as a government check and are the most patriotic and safest way to hold interest earning money for any future need. Their money is always instantly available after the required 60 days have passed.

The government does not want bonds cashed, and those who cash theirs, except in extreme emergency, are unnecessarily hampering the war effort and for every bond cashed they or some fellow citizen must be sold another.

Bricker in Portland October 12

Oregon voters will have an opportunity to hear Governor John W. Bricker, Republican vice presidential nominee, at a big public rally at Portland's Civic Victory Center at noon October 12.

At 2:30 Governor Bricker leaves for Eugene and will make platform speeches at Salem, Albany, etc., from the train.

October 7th Mr. Bricker will be heard over KOIN between 6:45 and 7:15 p. m.

He is scheduled to speak the evening of October 11 at Tacoma which will be broadcast by nation-wide radio network.

According to information received by Mrs. E. L. Walters, her husband was slightly wounded in France Sept. 1. He has been overseas nearly a year.

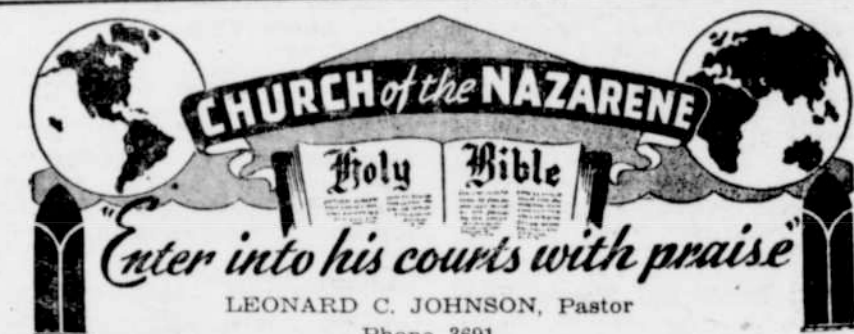
