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Nazi Spies Busy In Reborn Paris

French Authorities Caution Public Against Persons With German Accent.

PARIS.—Paris is a lovely place. The people are most cordial and hospitable. But you still have to keep your dukes up.

A blonde young lady at a cocktail party was very pleasant, spoke both English and French expertly, said she was an American who had married a Frenchman, and chatted about this and that.

"Oh, I'm still so afraid of German bombers," she said. "I wish they wouldn't take the anti-aircraft guns away."

"Who said anything about taking them away?" I asked.

"Well, there was one right near my house and it's gone," she replied.

I suggested that anti-aircraft batteries often change positions.

"But why have all the boys left the hotel where they were billeted?" she asked—a little too directly.

Has Cousins in U. S.
Later she sighed and said she had a lot of cousins in the U. S. army whom she hadn't seen for years.

Was there any way she could find out if they are here, she wondered. She volunteered names—some named Johnson, some named Moore, then one with a very unusual name.

I suggested that the army paper Stars and Stripes, might help.

"Oh, I've asked them, and they say they can't," she replied—just a little too quickly.

You may not realize it, but you have just listened to the conversation of a spy—practically page 10 in the textbook.

The young lady may or may not have been a spy, but she gave a perfect example of somebody trying to find out about troop movements. The whereabouts of her odd-named "cousin" might have pinned down a whole division.

Thousands of these innocent-sounding conversations have been launched—but not all finished when the subjects are wary—in Paris recently.

Many Nazi Agents Here.
There is no doubt that many Nazi agents still are here. French officials have warned the public against people with German accents who claim they come from the border of Alsace-Lorraine.

Why, with the Germans plunging to defeat, would anyone continue to help them? Maybe fanatical Nazi loyalty, maybe in hope of escaping from the rapidly tightening French surveillance, maybe just to pick up bits of money.

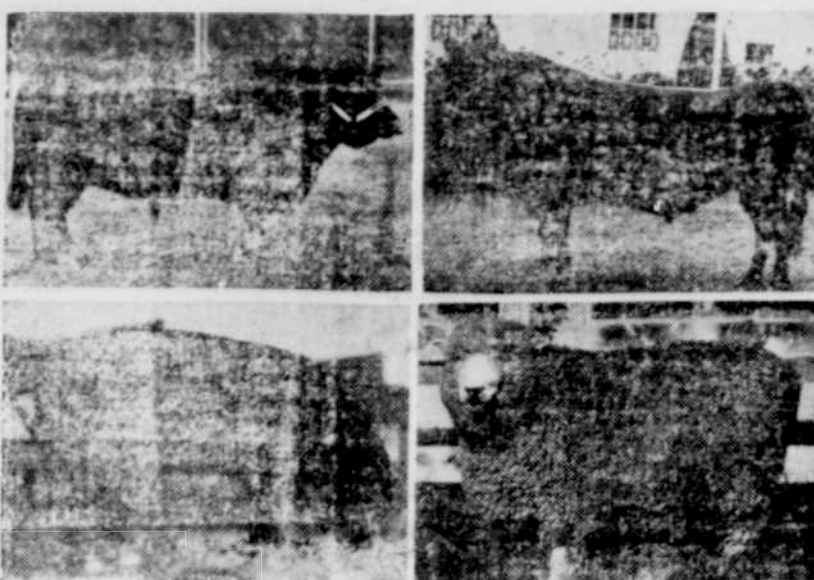

SIXTH WAR LOAN PRIZES—Granges of Oregon have accepted the responsibility for raising the State's entire rural quota of nearly \$13,000,000 in War Bonds during the Sixth War Loan drive. They are now competing for these prizes which will be awarded Granges having the highest per capita average of War Bond purchases and sales between now and December 31. To the winning Grange, east of the Cascades, will go a registered Aberdeen-Angus bull, upper left, donated to the cause by the Pacific Coast Aberdeen-Angus association. For Granges west of the Cascades, a registered Jersey bull of the type shown at the right is being offered by the Oregon Jersey Cattle club. The registered Duroc-Jersey sow, lower left, from E. C. Sammons, State chairman of the Oregon War Finance committee, will be given as second prize east of the mountains. Pacific Wool Growers association is giving a registered Romney ram, lower right, as second prize for western Oregon Granges. On a basis of the current Oregon Grange membership of approximately 25,000 the quota assigned in this Sixth War Loan drive will amount to \$500.00 per member which they must either buy or sell. This is the first time in Oregon's history that a quota for the state's farm people has been set.

Urges Halt in Poultry Expansion

The poultry industry needs to move at once toward voluntary curtailing production to avoid government control if possible, in the opinion of leaders of the industry heard at the recent meeting of the Oregon Baby Chick association, held in Salem.

The association urged by resolution that the government price support on eggs be lowered from 90 to 80 per cent of parity to avoid continued expansion. If government price support is continued, eggs ought to be purchased on U. S. grades rather than case count, the association also held.
