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Save Tin Cans

Counties Urged to Collect Every Month

In a measure designed to effect necessary increases in the salvage, collection and shipment of tin cans for the war effort and to make people of this state conscious of the appalling number of tin cans which still are going into garbage dumps into the proper channels, the State Salvage Committee this week announced that monthly "tin can quotas" have been established for Oregon counties during the first quarter of 1945.

Washington's county's monthly quota has been set at 8 tons.

Claude I. Sensenous state chairman called upon all Oregon citizens to recognize the seriousness of the current slump in the salvage of tin cans and particularly urged that volunteer salvage committees bend every effort toward providing adequate collection facilities for this much-needed material.

Very Alarming

Drop In Fat Salvage

Overconfidence and meat shortage have caused a "very alarming" drop of 25 per cent in the average monthly collection of household fats throughout the nation, Alexander Williams, director of information for the American Fat Salvage committee, Inc., has announced.

"The situation is very alarming," Williams said, "because the war food administration tells us there is going to be a big drop in national production of fats and oils in 1945. Every drop of fat should be saved. Fat is an extremely critical war material."

Goal Set at \$36,000

The people of Washington county will be asked this March to contribute to their Red Cross a total of \$36,000 according to word received by O. B. Gates, county chairman, from Verne Simmons, manager of Pacific area headquarters.

The announcement was made after news was received from National Red Cross headquarters in Washington, D. C., that the total goal for the nation in the annual fund raising campaign to be held next March has been set at \$180,000,000.

Of Washington county's quota, \$14,000 will go to the extensive Red Cross operations carried on at home. The remainder, \$22,000, will go to the National Red Cross so that extensive Red Cross overseas and national programs may be financed and extended.

Babson Quizzes CIO's Demand for More "Shops"

Babson Park, Mass., Jan. 5, 1945—When Vice President Wallace spoke to the CIO Convention in Chicago he gave "small business" a big hand. This drew another big hand from the Conventioners. Said he in substance: "After the War, this nation eventually must provide sixty million jobs. To promote employment, I urge that a man of ambition and ideas find a shack in an alley, start up a business, and hire workers."

Mr. Wallace further asked for tax relief for the "little man with the big idea." Although constructive in intent, Mr. Wallace's talk stopped far short of the core of the trouble. When the unemployment crisis emerges—three years, say after warfare ends—why more "shops?" The need will be not for more inside shops but for more outside salesmen. Small businesses rent stores that they do not make jobs.

Shortages of salesmanship will be the reef on which some of Mr. Wallace's mechanics may fall apart. Apparently some of the employment analysts invite disillusionment if they believe that every expert tool-maker can take his patent or project and shoeing it into a fast-growing, heavily-pay-rolled industry. The mechanical genius normally is an indifferent businessman. He can handle any metal but gold or silver. He can hold to the thousandth of an inch more readily than the hundredth of a dollar. My friend Thomas A. Edison was somewhat of an inventor. He used to tell me: "Babson, it takes more to get an idea rolling than to get the idea."

Tax Filing Date Explained

Joseph D. Nunan, Jr., Commissioner of Internal Revenue, reminds individual income taxpayers that Congress has changed from December 15, 1944, to January 15, 1945, the final date for filing declarations of estimated income tax, either original (as in the case of farmers) or amended, and paying of installments of estimated tax for the calendar year 1944.

Among the taxpayers affected by this change in dates are: farmers who exercised their right to defer declaration last April 15; others who have really filed 1944 declarations but desire to change their estimates by filing amended declarations; all persons who owe the final installment of 1944 estimated tax.

Deputy Collectors from the internal Revenue Service, Portland, will visit Hillsboro Jan. 12-15, inc. for the purpose of assisting farmers in preparing forms 1040-ES, Declaration of Estimated Tax for calendar year 1944. Other taxpayers will be assisted later, says J. W. Maloney, Collector.

Should Notify War Dept. Of Change of Address

News concerning men overseas, is of vital importance to their families, is often delayed unnecessarily due to failure of dependents to notify the War Department of changes in address, the Ninth Service Command Adjutant General's office, Fort Douglas, Utah, declared today.

In one month as many as 4,000 telegrams were returned to Washington, D. C., because the addressee could not be found, official reports reveal. Practically every case of non-delivery was due to failure of the addressee to report the correct and complete address.

Both new and old addresses should be given in addition to the soldier's full name, rank, serial number, organization, and his APO number.
