Great Electric Current Tamed

New Safety Valve Controls Highest Power Ever Sent Over Wires.

PITTSBURGH. — The greatest concentration of power ever sent into a piece of electrical equipment in a public test—nearly 3,000,000 kilovolt amperes—was stopped in its tracks by a newly developed mechanical "safety valve."

The mighty current, which engineers said was as great as if the total electrical output of all power stations in the Pittsburgh area had been thrown onto one transmission line and stepped up through a "fault" condition, was hurled into a new type circuit breaker which dispersed its arc harmlessly in a fraction of a second. A "fault," which may be caused by lightning or a short circuit, sends over a transmission line a short circuit current far more powerful than the normal current carried in the wire.

One hundred and fifty leading power company executives and engineers of the nation viewed the test at the Westinghouse high power alternating current laboratory in East Pittsburgh.

Huge Charge 'Drowned.'
As they watched, relays automatically detected the coming of the man-made super-current and the breaker, acting more swiftly than the surging power, spontaneously threw out switches causing its arc to be dispersed in a tank of oil. A similar current on a regular transmission line, unprotected with the highly developed circuit breaker, would have crashed through to render useless valuable electric equipment, engineers said.

The new low oil content circuit breaker also was demonstrated in tests with less severe overcharges in which it automatically "doused" the "fault" and reconnected itself to the regular line, all in a fraction of a second. Engineers declared that in regular use the equipment could perform this act so quickly that a person watching an incandescent lamp attached to the circuit would scarcely notice a flicker.

A continuing fault on the line, however, causes the circuit breaker to again interrupt itself and transmit a signal to the control board revealing the condition. It then remains open until the condition is rectified.

Two Generators Used.

Two huge generators, especially constructed, supplied the phenomenal amount of current for this test. At other conference sessions delegates to the power engineering conference heard discussions of recent advances in various branches of electrical and steam engineering and were given a glimpse into the future possibilities of the gas turbine.

The gas turbine, simplest of all engines in that it has few moving parts, is approaching the stage of practical application in a major field and has important possibilities for wider use, the engineers and power company executives were told.

"Rapid development of efficient compressors and turbines, and of materials that are suitable for service at high temperatures, has allowed outstanding advances during wartime in the gas turbine power system, which, though very old in principle, had to await these refinements," said C. B. Campbell, manager of engineering.

Wider applications of the gas turbine in the fields of transportation, in the chemical industry, and in connection with blast furnace operation were predicted for the near future.

March of Dimes Starts January 14

Forty-three prominent industrial and civic leaders have been appointed as State Chairmen for the March of Dimes and will direct the Fund-Raising Appeal of The National Foundation for Infantile Paralysis, January 14-31, in their states. It was announced today by Basil O'Connor, Foundation President.

Although the infantile paralysis epidemic of 1944, with nearly 19,000 cases already reported, was the second largest in the recorded history of the disease in the United States, the nation was better prepared for the march of the Crippler than ever before, through the generosity of the American people whose dimes and dollars helped to stem the tide of the mysterious poliomyelitis for which there is no known preventive and no cure at present.

E. T. Hedlund of Portland, will direct the Oregon drive.

S. P. Traffic Climbs To All-Time Peak

Southern Pacific's freight and passenger loads piled up new all-time traffic records in 1944. President A. T. Mercier, reported today in a statement of the railroad's activities.

Among the chief factors enabling the rail lines to carry the vastly increased wartime transport burden, the railroad president listed good teamwork within railroad's own organization, with its customers, with military and government agencies, and close cooperation among the railroads, which comprise the country's transportation system.

He said: "The Southern Pacific looks to the future with confidence," he declared. "We are not afraid of postwar competition. All we ask is that we be afforded the opportunity of competing with other forms of transportation on a fair and equitable basis."

Philip Thorne new President

Philip Thorne was elected president of the Cedar Mill Community Club at a recent meeting. Tom Gallagher is vice president; Bert Reeves, treasurer; and Lois O'Connor, secretary. The club meets on the second Thursday night of each month at Leedy grange hall in Cedar Mill.

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Use More V-Mail

Use of V-mail by civilians in writing to service men overseas must be stepped up in 1945 to conserve critically needed transport space, the Office of War Information reported today on the basis of facts from the Army and Navy. An intensified campaign urging the public to increase its use of V-mail was opened January 1, 1945, by the War and Navy Departments with the cooperation of OWI.

While the total volume of Army and Navy V-mail incoming and outgoing, is almost twice that of 1943, recent drops in the use of the microfilm service by both service men overseas and civilians at home has been of concern to the Army and Navy.

Red Cross workers, morale officers, chaplains and others who listen to GI troubles suggest that civilian correspondents avoid writing "dangling" letters to men overseas—letters for example, telling of an illness in the family without giving reports on progress toward recovery. In sending V-mail letters in sequence, they point out, especial care should be taken by the correspondent to see that page 1 doesn't announce striking news that is explained on the second form. V-mail letters may not arrive in sequence and the service man or woman may be kept in a state of suspense dangerous to his morale.

Bulls Flew to Russia

An Eighth Air Force Fighter Station, England—Staff Sergeant Valmore H. Bullis of Beaverton played a small but important part in the fourth shuttle mission to Russia, the largest of its type ever launched by the Eighth Air Force, during which supplies were dropped to the Patriots of Warsaw by the planes which covered 3800 miles before returning to England.

Taking off from a base, the fighters were hampered by heavy clouds until they reached Poland, where they found perfect visibility. Four German fighters were shot down over Warsaw by the powerful Mustangs as a swarm of twenty enemy planes attempted to intercept the big bombers dropping food, medicine and ammunition to the besieged Poles in the smoking city.

From the Polish capital, the force flew hundreds of miles eastward to land at a base in Russia, and complete the first leg of the journey.

Leaving Russia, the fighters flew to Italy, which the Americans describe as "muddy and poverty-stricken," to complete the second section of the long journey. The force completed the trip when the fighters landed in England, after flying across the Continent from Italy.

Before his enlistment in September 1942, S Sgt. Bullis taught school at Beaverton. His wife, Mrs. Florence R. Bullis, resides in Beaverton.

Change in Procedure

Farmers who need lumber for emergency maintenance and repair of farm dwellings may now apply to the War Administration for preference ratings, instead of War Production local field offices, S. A. Smith, regional manager announced today.

The change in procedure, according to Smith, is effected by an amendment to Directive 26 issued on December 29th. Under delegation of authority already provided by Directive 26 WFA assigns preference ratings to farmers for lumber for all other permitted uses.
