Science Church Passes Fiftieth Year

Christian Scientists January 6th ob-
served the 50th anniversary of the
dedication of the Mother Church, the
First Church of Christ, Scientist, and
a half century of religious accom-
plishment.

The Christian Science committee of
publication announced today that
when the original Mother Church was
dedicated, there existed about 200
Christian Science churches and so-
cieties, and that today there are 2870
churches and societies, not includ-
ing 68 college and university branch-
es, scattered throughout the world.
In the last year, the announcement
said, the board of lecturership deliv-
ered more than 4000 lectures to au-
diences aggregating nearly 3 million
persons.

The war finds 124 full and part-
time war ministers serving in mili-
tary areas, with 626 volunteer war
workers overseas and at home, and
26 Christian Science chaplains with
the armed forces.

Rural Bond Sales

Effective Step In Postwar Planning

WASHINGTON, D. C.—Secretary of
Agriculture Claude R. Wickard today
called on American farmers to invest
all "extra" dollars in War Bonds during
the Sixth War Loan beginning Novem-
ber 20 as an "effective step in postwar
planning" for rural America.

Directing his appeal "To the Farm
People of America," Secretary Wick-
ard said, "the farm people of this
country have an outstanding war rec-
ord."

It still takes a lot of money to
finance the war, even though we are
winning. The single task of supplying
the Pacific theater is a tremendous
undertaking. Add to that the equip-
ment which was needed on the in-
vasion coast of France, the supplies that
are required now to knock down the
walls of Hitler's Germany, and the
total is staggering. So our job here at
home is by no means over, just as the
war on the fighting front isn't over.

Our homefront responsibility is two-
fold: One is to stick to our job and do
it well until total victory is won; the
other is to buy War Bonds.

The farm people of this country
have an outstanding war record. They
have achieved a production miracle in
the face of wartime difficulties. Their
bond-buying record is good, too, as in-
dicated by the fact that farmers and
their families purchased more than one
and a quarter billion dollars' worth of
bonds in 1943. This figures out at about
10 per cent of their net income.

This Sixth War Loan campaign is
the biggest yet for agriculture, but
never before has agriculture had so
many dollars that could be put into
War Bonds. The record production of
farmers, coupled with favorable com-
modity prices, has pushed their income
up to an all-time high level. The in-
vestment of those extra, inflationary
dollars in War Bonds would be the
most effective step in postwar planning
Rural America could take.

"Take your share in the future—
share your stake in the war."

Britain Suspends Sale
Of National War Bonds

LONDON.—The sale of British na-
tional war bonds was discontinued
recently and in their place will be of-
fered a new security known as the
1½ per cent Exchequer Bond 1950,
Sir John Anderson announced.

The Chancellor of the exchequer
told commons that the bond was to
be issued at par and repayable at
par February 15, 1950.

He said Britain's total expendi-
tures during five years of the war
up to September 2 were \$96,000,000,
000, of which war services totaled
\$80,000,000,000.

Chain Gang Fugitive
