Chairman School Board Died Unexpectedly

Funeral services were held this week for Arch A. Bernard, personnel manager of Pointer Willamette and chairman of the Garden Home school board, who died unexpectedly Thursday evening at his home. Rev. A. R. Schmale, pastor of the Tigard Evangelical church, officiated and interment was held in Crescent Grove cemetery.

He is survived by his wife Beatrice, children, M. A. Audrey Ann Hanson, Portland, and Jim and Mary Lou Bernard at home, and his mother, Mrs. Leonora Platt Bernard, Schenectady, N. Y.

Mr. Bernard was a native of Schenectady, N. Y. For several years he was owner and publisher of the Pointer Enterprise, largest country newspaper in Pennsylvania. He later returned to his birthplace and went into the insurance business with his father until he came to Oregon in 1927. For six years he lived in Eugene and there for two terms was president of the Kiwanis Club and was also lieutenant governor of Kiwanis district out of Eugene. He continued in the life insurance business in Eugene and after he moved to Portland until the war started. Besides acting as personnel manager he also started and edited the house organ, The Pointer.

More Pressure Cookers

New aluminum pressure cookers will be appearing in retail markets during the coming winter and spring months. Housewives who will need this equipment for their 1945 home-canning will do well to keep an eye out for these cookers as small supplies are delivered to their local stores. Last fall the War Production Board allowed manufacturers enough aluminum to make 630,000 pressure cookers between October 1944 and July 1945. None could be too small to hold 7 quart jars.

Turks Get 98c Pound For Filberts

The Filbert and Walnut Market Development committee, with C. I. Seranous, chairman, are up in arms about the price of Turkish filberts which are now selling in New York by importers at 70c a pound, while Northwest shelled filberts at about 87½c a pound average. With the Turkish government subsidy of 40 per cent added to the 70c the Turks actually get 98c for their nuts. After they have paid out import duty of 8c, they still have 90c left.

Filbert growers are urged to get in touch with this market development committee for their own protection.

Spain's 1944 crop of filberts is estimated at about 40 Million; Turkey 50 Million and Italy 25 Million pounds.

The Pacific Northwest produced 6,560 tons in 1944.

Waste Paper Collections Slumped in Nov.-Dec.

During December, Oregon's volunteer waste paper collections slumped to their lowest level since last June, only 643 tons being reported by county salvage committees for the month, as compared to 1226 tons in November and 1545 tons in October. While some temporary decline in volunteer effort was to be expected during the Christmas season, it is well to emphasize that demands for waste paper for essential war and civilian uses are increasing rather than diminishing and that continued intensive activity on the part of salvage committees, youth groups, newspapers and cooperating organizations is vitally necessary if current and future needs are to be met.

FAILURE TO NOTIFY AGO OF ADDRESS CHANGES CAUSES DELAY IN CASUALTY NOTIFICATIONS

The War Department has urged all emergency addressees of soldiers serving overseas to keep The Adjutant General informed at all times of any address changes in order to avoid unnecessary delays in the transmission of casualty notifications.

Large numbers of casualty telegrams are being returned undelivered to The Adjutant General's Office because addresses of friends or next of kin to be notified in emergency are incomplete or incorrect. Practically every case of non-delivery has been directly attributable to outdated addresses resulting from the failure of the emergency addressee to notify The Adjutant General of any change of address. More than 4,000 such casualty telegrams are delayed every month.

Emergency addressees who have moved following the departure of the soldier for an overseas destination should write to The Adjutant General, War Department, Washington 25, D. C., Attention: Casualty Branch, giving both the old and new address. Also included should be the soldier's full name, rank, serial number and his organization and APO number.
