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Report Issued by Treasurer Scott

State Treasurer Leslie M. Scott has issued a report as of December 31, 1944, which shows cash in the treasury aggregated \$39,013,875.52, including \$13,301,912.06 of bond investments carried in cash account totals.

The total of bond investments was fixed at \$36,325,456.91. The unemployment compensation trust fund deposited with the United States treasurer is \$61,278,000.

The cash items included: General fund, \$21,208,633.67; land board, \$447,611.59; industrial accident commission account, \$1,036,134.17; board of higher education, \$1,796,849.98; board of control, \$44,358.52; highway commission, \$9,035,139.41; unemployment commission, \$115,157.36; veterans' state aid commission, \$210,702.33.

Vocational funds, \$404,588.57; public assistance, \$833,306.41; liquor control commission, \$993,351.54; miscellaneous \$50,923.75; state school support funds \$2,827,117.24.

To Demonstrate Farm Labor Saving Equipment

Two farm and home labor saving equipment demonstrations will be held in Washington county Jan. 26 and 27. The demonstration on Jan. 26 is to be held at the Sherwood grade school grounds and the one on January 27 at Forest Grove high school, reports Palmer S. Torvond, county agent. The meetings are scheduled to run between 10 a. m. and 3 p. m. each day.

The demonstrations will include a showing of both farm and home equipment using labor saving devices. Items have been included that will be of particular interest to home makers and to farm operators. Some local equipment designed and operated by Washington county farmers will also be included in the demonstrations. The farm home group includes laundry equipment, food preservation, kitchen sink unit, mixing table unit, and a number of others. Among the local women assisting will be Mrs. H. R. Johnson, and Mrs. L. W. Kingsley, both of route 2, Beaverton.

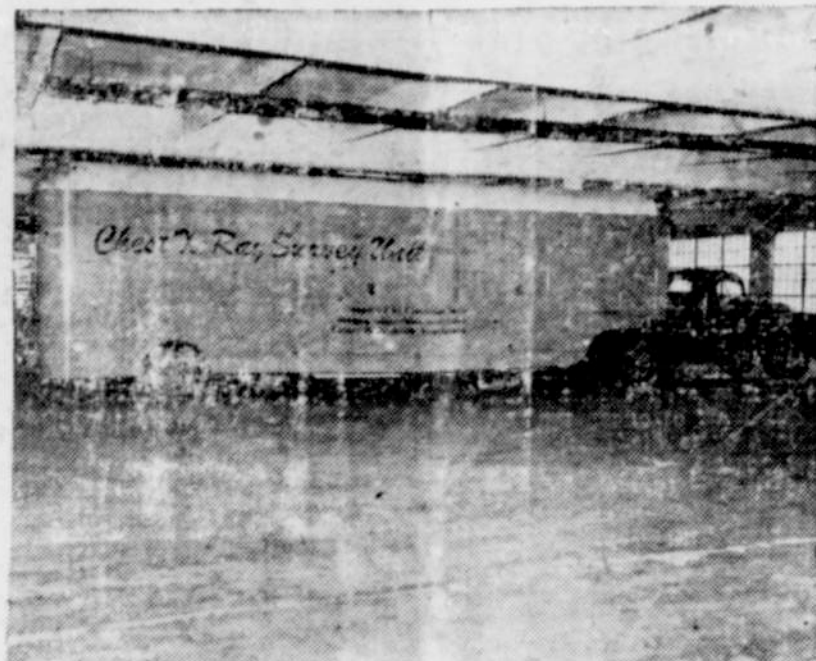
The Oregon veteran served as a caterpillar tractor operator with the Corps of Engineers at the Aleutian Islands.

Oregon's mobile Chest X-Ray Survey Unit began its tour of the State on December 28, 1944, giving free chest X-rays to the people of the counties. 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Cat Goes on Bombing Mission to Germany

A picture of Warren J. Smith of Metzger with a famous cat in his arms has been received by friends in the U. S. 1st Lt. Smith, who is with the 15th AAF in Italy is a 20-year old B-24 pilot and he was in the cockpit of his plane holding "Stowaway," a feminine feline hitch-hiker who recently accompanied Smith's crew on a bombing mission to Munich, Germany.

Puss, no stranger to the crew and pride and joy of the Liberator's crew chief, has been frequently known to make the heavy bomber a playground.

The cat had unobtrusively curled up beneath the pilot's seat and not until several hours later when the crew members were preparing to go on oxygen was her presence noticed.

She remained asleep under the seat until the bomb doors were opened on the target approach. Then she leaped upon the catwalk and stayed there until after the bombs were dropped on the target.

According to Lt. Smith, there was plenty of gloomy speculation among the members of the crew as to the effect upon the cat of the thirty below temperature and rarified atmosphere of the upper altitudes, but it was too late to do anything about it but await developments.

Apparently unaffected by the intense cold and lack of oxygen, the cat was driven from her precarious perch by a few loose flak bursts into the comparative safety of Lt. Smith's lap where she remained for the duration of the homeward journey.

Lt. Smith is the son of Mrs. Etta Sue Smith of Box 28, Garden Home, Oregon.
