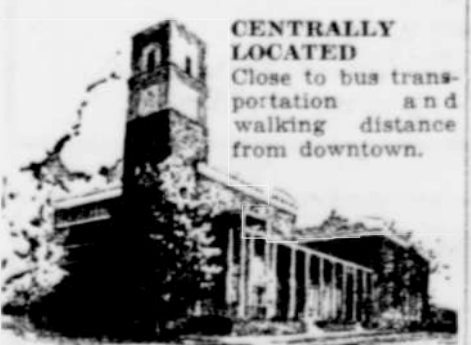

Develop Jute Cloth for

RAF Airfield in India

HDQ. SOUTHEAST ASIA COMMAND, KANDY, CEYLON. — A new, lightweight airfield surfacing has been developed by the Indian jute industry and is now being used on RAF fields in India and Assam. The new surfacing, called "Bithess," is made of bitumen-impregnated hessian, a coarse cloth made of jute. It is cheaper, lighter and more pliable than portable steel matting. "Bithess" is used as a foundation, to prevent water from seeping up from below in airstrips made on converted rice fields. As a surfacing it has withstood heavy rains.

She Has Heart of Gold; With Employer's Money

NEW YORK. — Oscar H. Gropper said his 22-year-old blonde bookkeeper had a heart of gold, but he wished she had never set out to make others' dreams come true.

The bookkeeper, Madeline Dunigan, still smiling dreamily, was arraigned for misappropriating between \$30,000 and \$40,000 to give unauthorized wage raises to fellow workers, pay for operations and set up a pension fund for a friend.

A messenger boy in Gropper's leather goods store who was struggling to get along on \$15 a week had his wages increased to \$25 a week. A handyman at \$3 a day was raised to \$15 a day.

One of Mrs. Dunigan's friends had a streak of hard luck. Mrs. Dunigan fixed her up with a \$25-a-week pension.

Death Rate of Prisoners of War Reported Dropping

NEW YORK, N. Y. — John F. Cotton, assistant director of relief to war prisoners service of the American Red Cross, said that the death rate among American servicemen held by the Japanese "has declined" in the last year.

Cotton told approximately 300 relatives of American war prisoners that "42 of 600 prisoners died in eight months" at a single camp in 1942-43, "but from August, 1943, to August of this year, only 12 of the remainder have died."

He said that the Japanese were believed to have 20,000 American prisoners, including 9,000 civilians and that several thousand still were held in the Philippines. Cotton said that medical supplies were limited in most camps.

Big Brother Makes the Relationship Quite Clear

PENINSULA, OHIO. — A seven-year-old boy, wheeling his brother in a buggy to an ice-cream parlor, remembered that he had forgotten his money.

He asked another youth to watch the baby while he dashed home. Returning, he found a third boy standing beside the baby carriage. "This your baby?" inquired the stranger.

PARIS. — Two soldiers convicted by courts martial of rape were hanged at Fort du Roule in Cherbourg, the United States army announced.

9,330,000 Horses

Counts on Rocket Help to Win War

Expected to Lend Punch to Knock Out Axis.

NEW YORK. — The U. S. navy is counting on rockets to provide much of the punch to knock out both Nazis and Japs, Capt. G. D. Linke, navy bureau of ordinance, told the reconversion congress of American industry.

Linke revealed that the navy laid down its first rocket barrage at Tarawa, and that since that time rockets have sharply reduced casualties during amphibious landings by reducing beach defenses to rubble. The navy also uses them to supply the initial impetus for planes to take off with heavy loads on short landing strips, he said.

Linke's remarks came as the reconversion congress—the 49th annual meeting of the National Association of Manufacturers—turned its attention to discussions of post-war industry.

Industry plans a quick reconversion when the government gives the signal. William P. Witherow, president, Blaw-Knox company, Pittsburgh, said that 49 per cent of industry will be able to swing over into full production the day the government gives a green light and that an additional 27 per cent will be able to resume civilian output within four weeks. He said 95 per cent of all industry can complete reconversion within eight weeks and 76 per cent of the firms can reach peak production in that period.

Dr. Gustav Egloff, Universal Oil Products company of Chicago, discussing prospective developments said:

"Postwar dwellings will hardly seem real when compared with our present homes.

"Developments in synthetic textiles are likely to overshadow or outmode the products of the silk-worm," he added, saying that textiles are now being woven from rayon, nylon, rubber, spun glass, woods from wood and soybeans, fibers from milk, casein and metals.

Save Lives of Wounded

FOE AGAINST THEIR WILL
LONDON, ENGLAND. — Seriously wounded German prisoners, unwilling to accept non-German blood, have been kept alive against their will by transfusions, Norman Bower, conservative member of commons said recently. He served notice that he would ask the war minister "if he will take steps to see that the lives of fanatical Nazi soldiers are no longer saved against their will."

POLK HOUSES

Columbia, Tenn., prizes its two Polk homes. It goes all-out in War Bond selling so that nothing may mar them. Samuel Polk's house, a two-story brick building with spacious rooms and French windows opening on to a grand balcony, was built in 1816. Next door is an almost duplicate home which Mr. Polk built for his daughter. The residence of James K. Polk, son, eleventh President of the United States, is a short distance away. The house where he entertained Andrew Jackson and Martin Van Buren during the campaign of 1844, when he was elected, is also of two stories and was erected in 1820. Relics of the budding years of this Nation that must endure, these homes inspire the purchase of War Bonds.

Chemical in Tissue Acts

Like Figurative Match

NEW YORK, N. Y. — A chemical which acts like a figurative match to start the fire of fever in a living body has been discovered at the Fearing research laboratory, Brookline, Mass.

The chemical is called pyrexin, from the Greek word meaning fire. Exudates of inflamed tissues from human beings, inoculated into a rabbit's ears, raised their temperatures about two and a half degrees, Fahrenheit. The pyrexin chemical is obtained from the protein portion of inflamed tissue discharges.

Whether fevers of all kinds may be due to this body fire lighter is not yet clear.
