Homemakers Can Save Strength and Time

Homemakers can apply many of the principles worked out by efficiency engineers for saving time and labor in war factories, says Miss Lutz extension specialist in home management at OSC. She lists six principles that any housewife may apply in her home:

- 1 Leave out any part of the task you can. Scald dishes, do not wipe; Do not iron sheets; Choose recipes that require less time and fewer utensils.
- 2 Make one task of two or more. When ironing pillowslips, handkerchiefs etc., fold as you iron. When possible serve food in dishes in which they are baked and serve meat and potatoes on the same platter. Or leave the plates in the warming oven and serve food from the stove, much as restaurants do.
- 3 Make both hands do. When putting away dishes, setting table and dusting.
- 4 Keep everything within easy reach. Keep coffee pot, coffee and measuring spoon together. Group ironing equipment.
- 5 Use best tool for the task. Tongs for removing jars and glasses from hot rinse water, taking baked potatoes from oven, etc. Pastry blender saves time. A long-handled dustpan prevents stooping and saves time.
- 6 Sit to work whenever you can. Much ironing can be done as well sitting as standing. A lap table saves effort in preparing vegetables.

After March 1st, 1945, the license fee is \$1.00 more for failure to procure license for the dogs above stated.

Also after March 1, 1945, the fee is \$1.00 more for failure to procure licenses for licenseable dogs becoming over 8 months of age after March 1, 1945, and for dogs over 8 months old, owned or kept within the State of Oregon over 30 days after March 1, 1945.

Licenses may be ordered by mail.
