Young Women are Urged To Enter Cadet Nurse Corps

With the demands of the armed forces increasing the nation's nurse shortage, the U. S. Public Health Service announces that there are 92 opportunities for young women of Oregon to enter the U. S. Cadet Nurse Corps during the first three months of 1945. These student nurses are needed, according to Dr. Thomas Parman, Surgeon General of the Public Health Service to provide nursing care on the home front and to help release graduate nurses for active duty with the military services.

Application for admission to the Corps should be sent immediately to Miss Elnora E. Thompson, State Recruiting Officer, Oregon State Nursing Council for War Service, 205 Stevens Bldg., Portland 5, Oregon.

A postal card designed especially to speed mail to American prisoners of war and civilian internees in the Far East is now available to relatives and friends of the prisoners through their local Red Cross. The new card, which may be obtained without charge and sent postage-free, has been designed to facilitate censorship, save weight and space in transportation, and speed delivery.

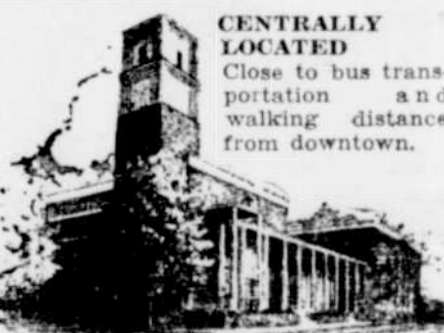

Postwar Opportunities

Babson Makes Suggestions For Servicemen

Babson Park, Fla., Feb. 16—Neither parents nor servicemen now realize the new conditions which they must face in the postwar era. The boys must not expect to find, upon their return, the same opportunities which existed when they were drafted.

War Reverses the Rules

(1) Before this war, it was bad to unfairly kill one's enemy; but now it is good to kill the enemy in any way and under any conditions. (2) Before this war, it was good to create things; but now it is good to destroy things. (3) Before this war, it was undesirable to regiment and desirable to have individual liberty; but now it is desirable to regiment and undesirable to have individual liberty. (4) Before this war, it was popular for the government to restrain expenditures; but now it is popular for the government to increase expenditures. (5) Before this war, it was wise to allow interest rates to rise to curb booming output; but now it is wise to keep interest rates down and produce beyond "capacity."

(6) Before this war, it was natural for stock prices to boom with business; but now it is more natural for stock prices to disregard wartime earnings. (7) Before this war, it was best to allow commodity prices to seek their supply-demand level; but now it seems wise to ration commodities and control prices. (8) Before this war, we could wait and allow God's justice to shine in due time; but now it appears necessary for us to completely upset American ways and principles.

If I were Young The greatest developments of the future will be along creative lines; possibly in connection with foods as researchers or small manufacturers or sales agents. If I were about to go to college today, I would specialize in biological chemistry; or, I would connect myself with either a pharmaceutical concern or a fertilizer corporation with the ultimate idea of getting into business for myself.

Insurance Attractive I am now a director in two fire insurance companies and one life insurance company. Many insurance companies are in ruins; and there are great opportunities with casualty insurance. The system used by Lloyd's has never secured a foothold here. It would be very tempting to develop it. Although I have constantly fought against "gambling" in stocks, I fully realize the human instinct to take chances. Although Washington has driven gamblers out of the stock market, they still love race tracks and number games.

Or one could start a company to specialize in "commodity" or "price" insurance and let speculators do the insuring, the company to serve only in finding the business. Further, it might be wise to sell such insurance through drug stores, restaurants, barber shops and various other outlets which are now handling the numbers game. I would let people bet on business affairs instead of on the foolish things they now bet on. This idea is sound statistically and ethically; it might offer a great future to thousands of returning servicemen. Don't Forget Good Soil Whatever your boys do, see that they own and live on an acre of fertile land within walking distance of post office, church and schools. In this connection, I am reminded of a

Dutch Saboteurs Wreck Bridges

With about three-fourths of the Netherlands still occupied by the Germans, one of the few remaining underground forces which must still work underground, continues to resist and harass the hated enemy in every way it possibly can.

Starving and freezing in the damp bitter Dutch winter, the underground nevertheless carries on. (Amsterdam rations are reported down to 450 calories per day as compared to Britain's estimated 3000, and fuel is exhausted to the point where park trees are being cut down and parts of homes used for wood.

The Dutch Government in London has received the following report from the region of Almelo, a strategic railway center in occupied Holland only a few miles from the German border and about forty miles northeast of Arnhem. This report, considered typical of Dutch underground activities throughout the occupied area, furthermore shows how these hidden forces are organized to co-operate with the allied armies.

All railroad bridges between Almelo and the towns of Hengelo and Rijssen (a radius of some ten miles) were blown up by Dutch saboteurs last November, twenty-four hours after the Netherlands Government in London had asked for intensive sabotage of the German war machine. The report also related that a freight train had been derailed, blocking the main Almelo-Rijssen railway for three days.

When, at the time of the invasion of Holland in September, the Dutch government ordered a general railway strike to co-ordinate with the attack of the Allied armies, railway workers throughout the Netherlands stopped work. In Almelo, the report said, the walkout was one hundred percent. The general strike is still on despite cruel reprisals by the Germans who have executed more than 160 workers, and have even wrecked their vengeance on the wives and families of the striking workers.

wise old gentleman who used to visit my office. He was Hon. Westmoreland Davis, ex-Governor of Virginia. He always carried a steel suit case. On day we asked him why he carried the odd suit case. Our bonds were no good; our cash was worthless. There was only one thing that came through. That was the land which we occupied. Those of us who stuck to the land came through. Security-owners, mortgageholders and absentee landlords were all wiped out." I do not mean to suggest that anything like this could happen here during the next 20 years; but it is wise to insure against everything.

Furnishes Good Program For Swing Shift Workers

Radio has a responsibility to provide swing shift workers with well-balanced morning programs, as a contribution to the prevention of absenteeism in war plants, T. K. Quinn, former director-general of the War Production Drive of WPB and author of the recently published "Original Labor & Management Committee Manual," today declared.

"Swing shift workers—those on the 4 p. m. to midnight shifts—have had their normal family and social life disrupted," Mr. Quinn said. This situation creates an opportunity and a duty upon radio networks and stations to provide the kind of morning programs that will appeal to these workers, instead of just those appealing to housewives.

Some stations and networks have well balanced blocks of morning shows, providing entertainment and information that appeals to everybody not just to y group. That is probably the soundest answer, from the standpoint of radio, to the question of what is it doing to prevent absenteeism in war plants by providing good morning programs.
