General Electric Present Check for \$10,000

Washington, D. C.—A check for \$10,000 was today presented by the General Electric Co. to the Future Farmers of America, a national organization to stimulate interest and knowledge of farm boys in electricity and its application to the farm. The presentation was made by G. A. Rietz, manager of the Farm Industry division of General Electric's Industrial divisions to Dr. W. T. Spanton, chief of agricultural service of the U. S. Office of Education and national advisor of the FFA.

This farm boy organization has 6900 active chapters in high schools of the country with an active membership of 240,000 and is recognized as the largest farm boy organization in the country. Since its organization in 1928 more than 1,000,000 boys have been members.

S. P. Campaigns for Industrial Growth of West

Southern Pacific Co. is conducting an intensive campaign to interest Eastern industries in locating in the West, and the results are gratifying, said Vice President W. W. Hale, in charge of system freight traffic for the railroad, in a talk prepared for delivery at the Western States Council's steel committee conference scheduled at Salt Lake this week.

"We already have assurance of quite large nationally known concerns that they intend locating important operations in the West," he said. "This list is being added to almost daily."

Rescue 7 Yank Flyers

Who Hid for Two Months

ABOARD A SEAPLANE TENDER, PHILIPPINES. — Seven men of a navy Liberator crew, who have been reported missing, were rescued after two months of hiding in a Japanese-held island in the Philippines. Among them was Ens. H. W. McDaniel of Illinois (whose home town is unavailable). His wife and baby live in Los Angeles.

All of the men had been injured, several seriously. One of the crew was killed and two were missing. The Liberator was hit by anti-aircraft fire and crashed into the China sea. Within a day after the survivors reached shore at a nearby island, a Japanese bomber was shot down, crashed in their midst, killing one of the survivors and re-injuring three. The men were finally picked up from a native sailboat.

The survivors are going to Sydney and then to the United States.

"G-Suit" Tested by Ray Helzer

An Eighth Air Force Fighter Station, England—Among the technically trained men at this Eighth Air Force P-51 Mustang fighter station who contributed to the successful tests of the "G-Suit" a garment which has eliminated "blackout" or, temporary dimming or loss of vision among fighter pilots during combat maneuvers, is Staff Sergeant Roy Helzer, 36, of Portland, Oregon, an airplane crew chief.

The tests which promise to benefit all Allied fighter pilots were made in combat by the 339th Fighter Group. Sgt. Helzer worked in the installations of a special valve and hose line necessary to the operation of the G-Suit, which is fitted with five rubber bladders which span the abdomen, thighs and calves, respectively. When they inflate beneath the tight-fitting suit, they compress the veins of the lower extremities to prevent any rush of blood from the pilot's brain during high-speed turns and abrupt pull-outs. The suit receives its pressure from the vacuum pump of the airplane, the bladders inflating in direct proportion to the amount of centrifugal force exerted against the pilot. When there is no undue stress, the bladders remain deflated.

Orson Platt and Erastus Snow emerged from the East Canyon the morning of July 21, 1847, and marvelled at the beauty of the Great Salt Lake Valley, Utah. Later Brigham Young, suffering from "mountain fever," arrived with the rear guard of settlers. Dobie Awarded Air Medal

15th AAF in Italy—2nd Lt. Delmar H. Dobie, 22, route 1, Tigard, Ore., bombardier in a B-24 Liberator Squadron, has been awarded the air medal for "outstanding performance of duty in aerial flights against the enemy." Since his arrival in Italy last September, Lieutenant Dobie has become a veteran of missions to the aircraft factories and oil refineries at Vienna, and German industrial installations at Munich and Blechhammer. Other targets, which the young bombardier has bombed, have been air fields and railroad yards, in Northern Italy and Austria.

He attended Oregon State College and was a member of the Delta Sigma Phi fraternity.

After entering the air corps in Feb. 1943, he attended gunnery school at Las Vegas, Nev., and received his bombardier wings at Victorville army air base, Victorville, Calif.

His wife, Mrs. Ruth L. Dobie, resides at route 1, Tigard. His parents reside in Portland.
