Soldiers Remember Real Service Given by Red Cross

Tribute to the American Red Cross for its effectual efforts in aiding morale and giving assistance to military personnel, was paid today by Col. Robert L. Allen Jr., commanding officer of Portland Port of Embarkation.

"Hundreds of thousands of American soldiers will remember the kindnesses and many deeds of real service given them by the American Red Cross," declared the port commander. The Port of Embarkation is an installation of the Transportation Corps, Army Service Forces. Wherever soldiers are encamped, wherever soldiers are on the move, the American Red Cross is on the job, serving the men of the armed forces to make their ordeals easier. Many services have been rendered by the Red Cross to thousands of Americans long prisoners of the enemy.

Americans who have been liberated from enemy prison camps, and some who have managed to escape, have told how they were able to endure their hardships and actually to survive because of food parcels sent to them regularly by the American Red Cross.

Possibility of a 49th State

Juneau, Alaska—The territorial house unanimously passed memorial early in the current month which has been sent to the U. S. There is of course, possibility of the memorial receiving recognition and thus adding one of the worlds most important districts to our national group of states.

Work or Fight Bill H. R. 1752

Recently the House passed the May Bill, H. R. 1752. It has been called the "Work or Fight" bill. This is a misnomer as this bill does not compel registrants to work or fight. Much confusion has arisen due to the fact that many bills have been proposed with respect to utilization of manpower, covered by the May bill and much of the criticism and discussion in editorials, newspaper columns and on the radio is due to the confusion arising from lack of knowledge as to the exact provisions of H. R. 1752, which was not introduced until January 24, 1945. Many of those who are criticizing it have not had an opportunity to read and study it. A major misconception of the bill is that it requires a registrant to join a union in order to work. Under the provisions of the bill this is not true as the bill contains no such mandate and on the other hand gives the registrant a reasonable choice of employers for whom to work. Three of the four Representatives from Oregon in the House, including myself, voted for the bill and one voted against it. I will endeavor in this news release to give my reasons for my vote and also to explain the provisions of the bill itself.

The underlying purpose of this legislation is to provide for the full utilization of our manpower in the winning of the war at the earliest possible time in order to end the war without an hour's delay or loss of one unnecessary life. There is little disagreement with respect to this objective but there is a great diversity of opinion as to how the objective may be accomplished. For my own part as your representative here in Congress during these crucial war years, I have determined to uphold the military leaders in the prosecution of the war and not attempt to substitute my judgment for theirs on military problems. The problem involved in this bill is of the greatest military importance, in fact the legislation enacted on this subject may result in shortening the war and saving many thousands of lives. On the other hand without adequate legislation the war may be prolonged with the resulting costs in lives, money and suffering of our own people, not only on the battle fronts but on the home front as well.

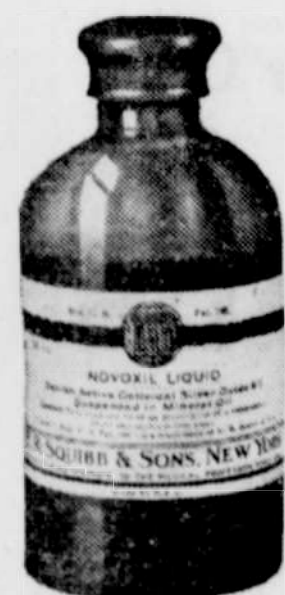


WARREN J. SMITH
