Red Cross Faces Greatest Task in Fourth War Year

WASHINGTON, D. C. — Facing the greatest task in its history in serving American fighting men on advancing war fronts overseas, their families at home, their buddies returning to the United States after discharge, and the American people in emergencies on the home front, the American Red Cross will launch its third War Fund campaign March 1.

That the American people will respond with overwhelming generosity to the appeal for \$200,000,000 to carry on this world-wide program is already indicated in the nation-wide determination to meet all its war needs and to bring the five-year struggle to an early and successful conclusion.

In every invasion during the past year, Chairman Basil O'Connor of the American Red Cross said, Red Cross workers have either gone with the troops, or have followed within a very short time. Red Cross field directors were with General Eisenhower's men in the great amphibious invasion of France, and with General MacArthur's forces when they returned to the Philippines.

Ten thousand men and women wear the Red Cross uniform overseas, serving in every theatre of war and with every command. They work in leave clubs, clubmobiles, rest houses, hospitals. Red Cross men attached to fighting units are with those outfits even in actual combat. Red Cross girls dispense snacks at air fields, along trucking supply routes, behind front areas and in liberated cities.

Many, both men and women, are on duty at scores of isolated outposts throughout the world, and give aid to wounded men in hospitals and on hospital ships, planes and trains. Away from the battle areas, thousands more serve at military and naval installations within the United States.

Red Cross service on the home front has expanded with the ever-increasing demand upon it, Mr. O'Connor said. In addition to collecting more than ten million pints of blood for plasma since the beginning of the war, the Red Cross has met requests of the Army and Navy for whole blood shipments to European and Pacific battle areas. Ten centers on the East and West coasts already participate in the collection of Type O whole blood, while others stand ready to join in that program as military needs warrant.

At four packaging centers, manned by volunteer workers, more than 20,000,000 food parcels have been turned out in a steady stream for shipment to prisoners of war and civilian internees in Germany and the Far East. Surgical dressings—775,000,000 of them—were prepared in the past year alone for front line and hospital use. Production workers in hundreds of communities have continued the never ceasing program of making warm garments for destitute civilians in war-torn countries overseas, and in those countries the Red Cross has assisted the Army in caring for refugees and homeless people.

Nor has its service to the armed forces on a global scale caused any relaxation on the part of the Red Cross to carry out its traditional service to the American people in time of disaster. More than 200 domestic disasters—floods, high winds and fires—have found Red Cross workers on the job to relieve stricken families and to aid in the rebuilding of communities.

"The need for Red Cross services in the coming year will be greater than ever before," Mr. O'Connor said. "In fulfilling the Red Cross appeal for \$200,000,000, the American people will indicate its wholehearted backing of men in the front lines."

Now Is Time To Prepare Gardens

Victory gardeners who have a choice of garden sites will get better results by choosing a level, or gently sloping, free working soil with not too much shade from buildings or competition from nearby trees, advises Palmer S. Torvond, county agent. Torvond says there is much more interest in victory gardening now than was expected several months ago because world conditions have shown that home-grown vegetables will be vitally needed again this year.

How soon to work the garden plot will depend on the type of soil, Torvond adds. Sandy soils can be worked in the spring and can be worked early, although they dry out more rapidly and may require more fertilizer. Heavier or clay types of soils are damaged by too early working, although some gardeners successfully crowd the season with just a small portion of the plot worked for the earliest vegetables.

A simple test for proper dryness of clay soils for spading or plowing is to squeeze a sample of soil from the bottom of the furrow or spade depth into a ball. If the particles stick together the soil is too wet to work, but if they separate easily the garden may be spaded or plowed safely. There is danger of working heavy soils too wet the county agent cautions.

Organic matter from farm manures, compost and cover crops is an essential for good garden soils. Barnyard manure or compost is applied at the rate of 10 to 20 tons per acre, or in smaller terms, 100 pounds per square rod, or 50 pounds to each 100 square feet.

Ample supplies of victory garden fertilizer are available most places, with the 6-10-4 formula favored for most Oregon soils. This can be spread at the rate of one to one and a half pounds per 100 sq. feet before spading or plowing, in addition to side dressings made at planting time.

Liming garden soils in western Oregon is not usually as important as some think, Torvond believes, though 1 1/2 pounds of hydrated lime per 100 square feet, or not to exceed 8 to 10 pounds of wood ashes per hundred square feet may be used. A common error is to use too much lime or wood ashes.

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Food Affects I. Q. Of Tots Before 4

Survey Reveals Results of Good Nutrition.

NEW YORK.—Evidence that good nutrition before the age of four raises the I. Q., the intelligence, of children, is reported in the American Journal of Digestive Diseases by Dr. I. Newton Gugelmass of New York City.

He studied 182 children for 14 years. Some were well nourished and others ill-nourished, divided evenly. In each group also nearly half were mentally retarded and the other half mentally normal.

The intelligences of all were tested, and then the ill-nourished were given good diets continuously for some time and retested. At the same time those who had been well nourished all the time were retested, as a check against influences other than nutrition.

The ill-nourished children all showed a rise in intelligence due to good food. The children who had been well fed all the time showed no such rise.

The average increase in I. Q. was 10 points for the mentally retarded children and 18 for the normally healthy ones.

But the rise in intelligence was significant up to age four and negligible in the older ages. This was particularly striking in the malnourished, retarded children. Up to age four their increases in intelligence were 5 to 10 times faster than in later years.

The average intelligent, malnourished children also showed a more rapid I. Q. rise before age four than afterward. But among them the differences before and after were not large.

The I. Q. is something inherited that after early childhood remains about fixed throughout life.

Injured in Plane Crash, His Life Saved by Nurse

WASHINGTON, D. C. — A fast-thinking flight nurse was credited by the army with saving the life of a crewman on a hospital plane after his throat had been cut in the crash of the ship.

She is Second Lieut. Louise Hawkins, 23, Redwood City, Calif., who was in charge of 24 litter patients aboard the air transport command plane flying from Palau to Guadalcanal in the Pacific.

The pilot of the plane, First Lieut. George W. Jones, 23, St. Albans, W. Va., crash-landed the plane on a tiny island when its gasoline supply ran out. All those aboard, except the one crewman, escaped injury.

Swiftly and efficiently the war department related, Lieutenant Hawkins fashioned a suction tube from a syringe, a colonic tube, and inflation tubes from a life-saving jacket, and with this contrivance kept the man's throat clear of blood until a destroyer arrived 19 hours later. The identity of the injured man was not disclosed.
