

News From Salem

The house amended and passed a senate joint resolution calling for congressional enactment of postwar compulsory military training as approved, it urged that all youths be taken for a year of military service at age or a three-year period in the reserve officers' training corps, national guard or citizens military training camps. A year of service at 21 would be mandatory if the alternate training had not been completed.

A new office, director of veterans affairs, who will have direct charge of virtually everything affecting men returning from the service, including state loans for farms and homes and grants for educational aid, will receive \$5000 a year and its seven members will be made up of representatives of veterans' organizations and must include at least one world war II man.

The senate taxation and ways and means committee decided at a meeting Monday, to recommend that only the five-mill, two-year tax for higher education and state buildings, and the two-cents a pack cigarette tax be placed on the special ballot June 22.

At the Teachers county institute held March 9-13 Corrie Pennington, Washington county health department, spoke of the work being done for handicapped children. The last legislature passed an act designed to help these children and help will be available to those in grades 1 to 12 inclusive who are hard of hearing, crippled, low in vitality, etc. There are close to 10,000 children in Oregon schools who will benefit by this act. The institute was supplemented by a week or more of intensified examinations for handicapped children throughout the county during the week of April 9 through 13.

Red Cross Notes

The Southwest Surgical Dressing and Sewing Unit will convert its energies, (at least temporarily) to the much needed sewing of hospital garments and kit bags, starting next Monday. The present surgical dressing quota has been completed and new shipments of materials have not been received. At present the army is conducting an inventory of its adequate surgical dressing supplies on hand and as soon as future needs are determined allocation of quotas will be sent with necessary materials. It is an interesting fact that huge stock piles of surgical dressings are ready when and where needed and due to casualties being below anticipation the surgical dressing situation is good.

Proving the necessity of the sewing program of hospital garments will not be necessary and it is expected the loyal workers of our community will turn their hands to this new field of work as earnestly as they have to surgical dressings.

The Bethel Chapter of Multnomah will join forces with Red Cross the second and fourth Wednesday evenings of each month to work on infant garments. The garments are distributed by Home Service of Red Cross, upon careful investigation and only as an emergency measure, to the families of the two lowest paid groups of enlisted men. The package of baby garments consist of the following: 4 gowns, 2 slips, 1 sack, 1 cap, 1 band, 1 pr. booties, 1 pr. mittens, 1 doz. diapers, 2 shirts and 4 safety pins. This amount of clothing would tide over any emergency our service men's families might face. Home Service could relate many angles from which these emergencies arise. The helping hands who do Red Cross work, help to keep "The Red Cross by His Side."

More Appointments to be Made on county Committees

Kenneth Wilcox has been appointed as Red Cross disaster chairman for the county, according to announcement by Chairman J. B. Gates at the county meeting Thursday night. He succeeds L. C. Buchner, who resigned because of moving outside the county. Rev. Father George O'Keefe of Beaverton, who has received a call to a Catholic church in Salem, resigned from the county board and moved to Salem to assume his duties.

Cecil Davis of Eugene, area disaster field representative, was not able to be at the meeting as he received an emergency call to go to Cincinnati, Ohio, to assist in the flood disaster in Ohio and Pennsylvania.

Reports were heard from the different departments and they showed an amount of articles made and other activities.

The following letter has been received from overseas telling how the men appreciate the help of the Red Cross. Dear Ladies: Have just finished sewing on some buttons taken from a kit made by you. I have had the kit a long time. Each time I have used it I've thought of your kindness and have wanted to tell you of my appreciation—So here it is—Thank you so much.

I'm the assistant welfare officer on our ship. For an example, have taken 30 or 40 of the boys out fishing, worked as though they were paying me, and when the trip was finished had two or three thank me for the "good time they had." At first I was discouraged but I've learned that they do appreciate what you do for them—I'm telling you this because the Red Cross is doing so much to help and I'm afraid you might wonder some times whether we do appreciate your efforts. Dewey Signs New Bill
