Jenkins Help Build Cable to Save Medical Unit in Italy

With the Fifth Army, Italy, First Lt. Edwin Lowell Jenkins, whose wife Eunice, lives on route 1, Beaverton, is a platoon leader and a member of the 310th Engineer Combat Battalion, which recently built a cable tramway to reestablish contact with an inundated medical unit near the Po Valley in Italy. Floods had isolated the medical outfit, and only the improvised supply route kept the stranded unit in operation and provided for evacuation of wounded.

Keeping roads up to the infantry is the 310th primary mission, but it fought along the Arno River as infantry, cleared mines from roads subjected to German artillery, mortar and tank fire, chipped a seven-mile road from rock to enable doughboys to outflank Terracina, built permanent bridges for their parent organization, the 85th, "Custer" Division of Fifth Army.

The engineers, moving in on Highway 6, reached Rome on the day of its capture, June 4. They participated in the rapid advance from Rome to the Arno River, building two permanent bridges on Highway 1 between Rome and Leghorn and assembling three Bailey bridges on the Leghorn-Pisa road.

Manning the Arno defense line as infantry, men of the 310th carried out this assignment so well that they hadn't suffered one casualty at the end of five days.

The 310th came to Italy in March, after undergoing advanced training in North Africa.

Lieutenant Colonel John D. Cole, Jr., of St. Petersburg, Florida, a West Point graduate, commanded the battalion until recently, when Major Hugh K. Burch of Toledo, Ohio, succeeded him.

He was at Bastogne

With the 101st Airborne Division on the Western Front—Within two days after the 101st Airborne Division pulled out of Bastogne shortly after the Battle of the Bulge, it was completely sealed from outside help. When the Germans demanded surrender, acting division commander, Brigadier Gen. Anthony C. McAuliffe answered "Nuts."

The defense was to attack continuously. At one point, the ammunition rations were 11 rounds to a gun. No planes were able to break through low ceiling to bring support and supplies. There were too many wounded for the medics to handle.

But seven days after the encirclement, the battle of the Bastogne pocket ended. A corridor had been established with our own troops. The 101st Airborne had completed another chapter in its historic march through the battles of World War II.

In addition to participating in the battle of Bastogne, the 308th parachute infantry regiment played a major role in the success of the Normandy and Holland campaigns. It took part in the fall of Carentan and later liberated Eindhoven, in Holland. It twice took the measure of the elite German 6th Parachute Regiment in attaining victories in France and Holland.

Members of the unit who participated in Bastogne envelopment include Capt. Gene E. Brown, of Beaverton, Oregon.

The Japanese news agency indicated last week that about 3 million persons have been evacuated from Tokyo which before the war was the world's third largest city with a population of approximately 7 million.

Major Dillow Receives Air Medal in India

India—Award of the Air Medal was made recently to Major Joseph C. Dillow, Beaverton, Oregon, communication officer Tenth Weather Squadron, and co-pilot of cargo planes serving weather stations in China, Burma and India.

The award to Major Dillow was for meritorious achievement on a flight by a previously untraversed route to locality in China inaccessible except by air. After the plane was forced down by adverse weather in an isolated region, the crew rebuilt an inadequate runway and successfully resumed the flight to deliver vitally needed gasoline.

Did Not List Telephone Equipment

When the government recently issued its huge catalog of surplus commodities, it offered to the public just about every variety of goods imaginable—from bombers to barbed wire. If you were one of the lucky ones, you could even pick up a much sought-after jeep. But if you wanted telephone equipment, No. None was listed.

And this, according to Harley J. Barber, district manager of the West Coast Telephone Co., summarizes the telephone shortage with a finality no amount of explanation could have. Even Uncle Sam hasn't any more than he actually needs.

So if your hopes had been raised that the telephone you've been waiting for so long might be forthcoming soon, better be patient. The telephone companies have performed miracles of extending service, but even they can't provide equipment when none exists. Not only has production of telephone equipment—and that means not only telephones but switchboards and similar devices—been cut by production of other war material, but the smaller output is going to the armed forces exclusively.

A wide-spread report that the army was selling outmoded field telephones which could be adapted to civilian use was true. But the number was so small and the demand by vital war business so great that the effect on civilian requirements was nil.

"No business likes to turn down customers," Mr. Barber said. "But, until the war's end, there's little else we can do. Uncle Sam comes first."
