Ration Book Five Nearly Ready

A new ration book, No. 5, is being
prepared for the printers.
The OPA expect the present ration
books to last through September and
possibly October.

It is believed that the entire food
program will be shifted to the new
book when No. 4 runs out. Tentative
plans for the fifth book are based on
official estimates that meat, dairy
products, canned fruits and vege-
tables and sugar will continue to be
short after V-E day.

In case the new book is not ready
when the red and blue stamps in
book No. 4 run out, OPA expects to
switch temporarily to the green point
stamps for one of the food programs,
using spare stamps for the other.

Five Boys to Train For Labor Course

Washington county has been as-
signed a tentative quota of five boys
to be selected for one week's farm la-
bor training course to be given on
the Oregon State College campus at
Corvallis, between May 20 and June
17, reports Roy L. Davidson, farm la-
bor assistant.

Boys chosen will be selected from
applications filed at the farm labor
office in Hillsboro, and should be 14
to 17 years of age, in good health and
have consent of their parents. Each
boy will furnish his own blanket and
bedding, toilet articles and clothes.
All transportation will be provided by
the Farm Labor Service.

Any boy interested should contact
the Farm Labor Office, Hillsboro.

Railroad Noises

An editorial from the San Jose, California, "Evening News".
(San Jose is on the main line of Southern Pacific's Coast Line)

WE HAVE always resented those
snooty expressions, "across the
tracks" or "down by the tracks,"
with their implication that there
was something disreputable and
socially low-life about living near
railroad tracks. After living many
years a block from the Espee's
rails, we rise to say that there are
many worse places to live.

Living close to the railroad has
its obvious advantages when you
are a boy. Where is there a more
romantic place than the right of
way, with wheezing switch engines,
puffing freights (which travel so
much faster now than they used
to) and speeding passenger trains?
Morning, noon and night railroad-
ing holds attraction for a boy,
which is why so many of them go
into it, finding a romance which
never dulls until they die.

"But how can you stand the
noise?" someone asks.

Far from being bothered by the
noises, you get so you find them
soothing and conducive to repose.
You get so you can tell the freight
trains from the passengers, and
you distinguish the touch on the
whistle rope of that individualistic
engineer who makes his blasts so
short, sharp and distinctive.

The various whistle notes repre-
sent to you these giant creatures of
fire and steel talking to one an-
other over long distances and on
winter nights, when the wind is
blowing and the rain is pelt-
ing against the windows it is pleasant
to think of engineer and fireman,
seag in their cab with the fire roar-
ing below them, shunting lines of
cars up and down the glistening
wet tracks.

If these night noises from the
tracks are comfortable and appeal-
ing to you during peace they have

even more of these qualities during
war. You realize that both the wars
in which we are engaged are trans-
portation wars and must be won
not only in the foxholes and work-
shops but on the railroads as well.
Some of the particularly long trains
you hear puffing and snorting these
nights are troop trains and others
are weighed down with war's ma-
teriel. It is comfortable to reflect
that a great job the railroadmen
are doing, driving their trains and
switching their cars 24 hours a day,
even while you are asleep.

Back a few years, when trucks
and buses started to cut more and
more deeply into railroad revenues,
with the airplane as an additional
competitor just ahead, as a boy
living near the tracks you may
have wondered a little worriedly if
they would put your old friends,
the freights and passengers, out of
business. It took the war to show
that a nation's need of railroads
continues, that no nation can be
great and strong without them.
You are reassured by that, and by
the articles and drawings that have
been published of vastly improved
equipment which will help the rail-
roads get their share of traffic after
the war. Such things mean your
friends will be able to stay alive
and that, drowsily safe and com-
fortable, you will continue to hear
the trains chugging and puffing
through the night.

We thank the San Jose News for
so beautifully putting into words the
way we railroaders, and many other
people, feel about trains. 176B
