Tips on How to Send Mail Overseas

If you want to be sure your letters and packages are getting through to your son, husband, or friend out there with the Navy in the Pacific, take some tips released today from Navy postal authorities at Thirteenth Naval District Headquarters in Seattle, Wash.

DO be sure you have the correct address. If you fish around in your memory for that numerical designation and write 182 instead of looking it up and getting the correct number 128, your letter will be delayed about 90 days.

Don't use nicknames. Send your letter to "William Gaylord Jones, CM3/c, USNR, 847-32-15" even though to you he is "Bill."

DO wrap packages carefully. Use stout boxes, the heaviest wrapping paper, plenty of strong cord, and—when necessary—metal packing cases. Don't send perishable foods. Pack each article in shredded paper to prevent its movement inside the package.

DON'T use paper stickers on packages. They fall off when they get wet. Write addresses with ink on both sides of the package.

DON'T send newspapers and magazines. They clog the mails and hold up your letters. Instead clip interesting articles and enclose them in letters.

DO write often. The Navy Postal Service wants to help out by being accurate and cooperative, but they want you to write your man frequently. It is true that mail is one of this war's greatest morale factors. YOU are the only ones that can write the letters. Send them properly, and the department will see that they get there.

Tells a Farm Story

Big crops and good prices left a wheat farmer not long ago with \$30,000 cash in the bank. Said he, "If I don't invest this in inflated land values, what can I do with it to earn anything?" I said to him, "Did you ever think of using part of it to insure yourself a steady farm income after the war? For \$150 a month, or \$1,800 a year in War Bonds, you can begin to collect ten years after the war \$200 a month. As you will be getting older by that time, wouldn't that be a better supplement to what income the farm then produces than having to turn again to the cream can and what your wife can make out of chickens? Wouldn't it be a nice retirement fund for a fellow that is now 55 years old? Wouldn't you like to have had \$200 a month cash coming in last time?"

In addition, if you can put in War Bonds a lump-sum as reserve for operations in bad years, for deferred purchases of equipment, for repairs, for up-keep, for new household equipment; and then whatever the postwar adjustment, you would have an easier time of it than you had last time.

You wouldn't have to wait on somebody's extra special plan; you would have already completed one of your own.

These boys and girls should obtain a higher education in preparation for the years to come.

SPECIAL ELECTION NOTICE

NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN, That BERTHA WATER DISTRICT, Multnomah County, Oregon, a Municipal Corporation, will hold a Special Election at the BERTHA WATER DISTRICT Office, at SW 19th and Nebraska Streets, Portland, Oregon, within said District, on Friday, the 11th day of May, A. D. 1945, beginning at Eight o'clock A. M., and continuing to Eight o'clock P. M. of said day, at which there will be submitted to the legal voters of said District the following question:

"SHALL THE TERRITORY DESCRIBED AS FOLLOWS:

"Commencing at a concrete monument, set to mark the section corners for Sections Eight (8), Nine (9), Sixteen (16), and seventeen (17) of Township 1 South, Range 1 East of the Willamette Meridian, Multnomah County, State of Oregon; thence, North 89 deg 13' 30" West along the North line of Section 17 of said township and range, a distance of 660 feet to an iron pipe; thence, South 0 deg 19' 30" East a distance of 25 feet to an iron pipe; thence, North 89 deg 13' 30" West and parallel with the North line of Section 17, a distance of 310 feet to an iron pipe; thence South 0 deg 19' 30" East a distance of 680 feet, more or less, to the South line of Sunset Boulevard; thence, easterly along the South line of said Sunset Boulevard a distance of 540 feet, more or less, to the boundary line of the Bertha Water District; thence, northerly along the boundary line of the Bertha Water District a distance of 5 feet, more or less, to a corner of said boundary line; thence South 89 deg 13' 30" East a distance of 448.4 feet, more or less, along the boundary line of the Bertha Water District to the East line of Section 17 of said Township and Range; thence, North 0 deg 19' 30" West along the East line of said Section 17 a distance of 660 feet, to the point of beginning, all in the County of Multnomah, State of Oregon, be annexed to and incorporated with the Bertha Water District, a Municipal Corporation, of the County of Multnomah and State of Oregon, as an integral part thereof.

"All in accordance with that certain Act of the Legislative Assembly of the State of Oregon, passed at its regular session in the year 1927, entitled 'An Act to enable communities incorporated as municipal corporations for the purpose of supplying their inhabitants with water for domestic purposes to annex territory contiguous thereto; and providing that such territory so annexed shall be subject to the indebtedness of the original corporation.'

The officers of said election shall be: Alice Winnard, Chairman; Marietta Milson, Judge; and Mrs. Tracy J. Smith, Judge, or their duly appointed successors.

Whipped Cream

China—American Red Cross girls here have discovered a way to whip canned milk, so the men visiting Red Cross clubs staffed by them may have whipped cream in cocoa or on cake. Cans of milk are placed in boiling water for 15 minutes, after which they are plunged into a pail of cold water to chill them. The contents are then poured into a cold bowl and beaten with a wire fluffer. Often orange or lemon sauce is whipped into the fluffy cream to add variety to topping for cake.

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
