4. E Bonds may be cashed at any qualified bank for their full cost any time after 60 days from date of issue.
5. The U. S. Government's promise to redeem War Bonds any time after 60 days from date of issue is just as strong as its promise to stand back of a dollar bill.
6. You have to hold a Bond the full ten years to get any interest.
7. The lowest-priced War Bond costs \$25.
8. War Bonds are better than cash.
9. Two persons cannot own a War Bond jointly.
10. The only reason we should buy War Bonds is to help pay for food, ammunition, etc., for the armed forces.

Killed in Action

News of the death of T/S John Wilbur Spencer, formerly of Multnomah, has been received by his mother, Mrs. Mabel Spencer of Portland. Sgt. Spencer was in Hodge's Army under Col. Rinehart, in Germany, serving in the Infantry. He was killed in action on April 6th.

Surviving, besides his mother, are his wife, the former Betty Laursen, and twin daughters, Susan Elizabeth and Sherill Kathryn, aged twenty months, who reside in North Tacoma.

Local Boy Decorated

With more than twenty-five missions to his credit, S/Sgt. Albert D. Leinbach, 21, waist gunner on a B-17, has been awarded the fourth Oak Leaf cluster to the Air Medal, at his 8th AAF base in England, for meritorious achievement on heavy bombing attacks over enemy territory, according to an announcement received here.

Sgt. Leinbach is the son of Mr. and Mrs. A. D. Leinbach, 3643 SW Logan Street, and a graduate of Lincoln high school.

Symes Corporal Now

An Eighth Air Force Fighter Station, England—The promotion of Marvin Frederick Symes, son of Mrs. Carl Lehman, 3432 SW Moss Street, Multnomah, Oregon, from private first class to corporal, was announced recently at this Eighth Air Force fighter station.

Cpl. Symes is a sheet metal specialist in a service squadron attached to Col. Kyle L. Riddle's 479th Fighter Group of the 2nd Air Division.

An alumnus of Benson technical high school in Portland, he was employed in a bronze and brass company in Portland before entering the Army.

Awarded Distinguished Unit Citation

An Eighth Air Force Fighting Station, England—As a member of Lieutenant Colonel Elia H. Kinnard's high-scoring 355th Fighting Group, Staff Sergeant Valmore H. Bullis of Beaverton, Oregon, has awarded the ribbon of the Distinguished Unit citation of the War Department.

The 355th, one of the oldest fighter groups in this theatre and part of Major General William E. Kepner's Second Air Division, was given the award for its performance in an attack on airfields near Munich on April 5, 1944, in which the group's P-51 Mustangs flew through extremely adverse weather to carry out one of the first planned strafing assaults by Eighth Air Force fighter planes.

Led by Col. Wm. J. Cummings of Lawrence, Kansas, then group commander, pilots of the 355th destroyed 43 enemy aircraft on the ground and shot eight out of the air. In addition, the airmen reported damaging 81 German planes on the ground.

Paying tribute to the tightly-knit ground organization which has helped the group's pilots to pile up the impressive total of 331 enemy planes destroyed in the air and 302 on the ground, the citation stated, "the devotion to duty displayed by personnel of the 355th Fighter Group is in keeping with the highest traditions of the Armed Forces of the United States."

S/Sgt. Bullis, a fighter squadron airplane mechanic, was employed as a school teacher in Beaverton before entering the Army in Sept. 1942. He arrived in this theatre in July, 1943.

Fligge Now 1st Lt.

An Eighth Air Force Liberator Station: England—Sterling G. Fligge, of route 3, box 14, Beaverton, Or., copilot on a B-24 Liberator, has been promoted from Second Lieutenant to First Lieutenant.

The Lieutenant is a member of the 392nd Heavy Bombardment Group, commanded by Col. Lorin L. Johnson of Payson, Utah. The group is one of the oldest members of Major-General William E. Kepner's Second Air Division.

The 392nd Liberators have attacked more than 250 targets in Germany and enemy occupied territory. On the 392nd's log are missions to Berlin, Gotha, Bremen, Politz, Friedrighaven and other targets in Germany, France, Belgium, Holland, Poland and Norway. The 100th mission was made on D-Day in conjunction with the initial landings in France. The 200th was flown on Armistice Day.

Lt. Fligge attended Renton High School in Renton, Wash., and University of Washington. He was commissioned a Second Lieutenant in February, 1944. Prior to his entering the service Lieutenant Fligge was employed by the Boeing Aircraft Co., in Seattle. His wife, Mrs. Elizabeth M. Fligge lives at the home address. His parents live in Renton, Wash.

Eastman Dies of Wounds

Word has been received by Mr. and Mrs. Albert Eastman of route 5, Portland, that their son Jim Eugene Eastman, pharmacist's mate 3rd class, had died of wounds following action in the Pacific theatre and had been buried in allied territory.

Jim attended Cedar Mill grade school and graduated from Beaverton high school. He joined the navy in 1942 and after going overseas in January, 1944, took part in five invasions.

A brother Dale also survives.

Match Industry Leaders

Say There Is No Shortage

NEW YORK. — Military demands have sharply curtailed the home front's stocks of matches but the country is facing no real shortage, industry leaders assert.

Because they're smaller and occupy less cargo space, 100 per cent of the penny size safeties and 35 per cent of the folder type paper book matches have been requisitioned for war service. This leaves 120 billion paper book matches and 200 billion kitchen matches out of 1945's manufactures for civilian consumption.

The industry points out that of America's 100 million adults of match-using age about 30 million are equipped with lighters or do not use matches at all. As a result the available 1945 supply means 4.571 matches per capita for the year, ample for all needs if there is no hoarding the industry feels.
