Marshall, King Pledge Victory to 'Bond Front'

WASHINGTON, D. C.—The Army has overcome what in the past would have seemed to have been insurmountable obstacles and the Navy has promised full unconditional surrender, Chief of Staff General George C. Marshall and Fleet Admiral Ernest J. King said today, in commenting on the Mighty Seventh War Loan.

General Marshall said: "We in the Army have overcome what in the past would have seemed to have been insurmountable obstacles. So have you. That is where the enemy miscalculated—for to Americans, nothing has ever been impossible. Yours is a hard task—a heavy responsibility. But we of the Army have confidence that you will again achieve the impossible."

Admiral King said: "We have had two wars to wage. One of those wars is just beginning. That means that your own labors, far from over, are also just beginning. The Navy, like the Army, has one objective. The unconditional surrender of the enemy. We will attain that objective because of people of good faith. People who have demonstrated their patriotism and their willingness to undertake the most gigantic financial task ever undertaken by a free people."

Lewis And Clark

The Great American Odyssey
A Condensed Story of the Historic Expedition of 1804-6

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Continued from Last Week
Five Cents an Acre

After Livingston and Monroe had signed the treaty for the purchase of Louisiana, they commenced to inquire as to just what they had bought, but nobody seemed to be able to tell them. The exact boundaries of Louisiana were rather indefinite but, roughly they extended from the Gulf of Mexico to Canada and from the Mississippi river to the Rocky Mountains.

Louisiana at that time included all of the present states of Missouri, Arkansas, Iowa, North and South Dakota and Nebraska, and most of Louisiana, Kansas, Oklahoma, Colorado, Wyoming, Montana and Minnesota. This territory covered an area of 883,072 square miles, containing 565,166,080 acres. It was an area larger than England, Ireland, Germany, France, Spain and Portugal combined, and nearly as large as the original Thirteen Colonies.

The price paid for Louisiana was \$11,250,000 in bonds with interest at six percent, plus the claims of American citizens against France for goods seized and damage done by French privateers, amounting to \$3,750,000. When all the claims, plus the bonds and interest, had been paid, it brought the total cost of Louisiana to over \$28,500,000, or a trifle over five cents an acre for one of the richest sections on the North American continent. It was a price which would make a real estate agent turn green with envy.

President Jefferson's dream was about to come true. All obstacles had been removed. There was no more need for secrecy. Captain Meriwether Lewis, 29 years of age, private secretary to President Jefferson, was chosen to head the expedition to the far West. He was tall, blonde, of a serious almost morose disposition. He chose as his companion and equal in rank William Clark, who was 33 years of age. Clark was tall, red-haired, and of a happy nature. This was a young man's expedition and its members were chosen with great care, for theirs was a serious responsibility.

After some delays, the expedition left its camp on the Dubois or Wood river, opposite the mouth of the Missouri, a few miles above St. Louis, on May, 1804, and proceeded by boats up the muddy tide of the Missouri. The party had one keelboat, 55 feet long, drawing three feet of water, and equipped with a large square sail, and a small cannon called a swivel. Besides this boat there were two pirogues. A pirogue was a boat shaped like a flatiron, with a pointed prow, a square stern, a flat bottom. It carried four oars and was steered with a long sweep. It also carried a sail which was used when the winds were favorable. According to the journals of Sergeants Gass and Ordway, there were 43 men in the party, including Lewis and Clark.

The junction of Missouri and Kansas rivers was reached on June 26, site of the present Kansas City, where the river turned abruptly north. On July 4 the expedition was in the vicinity of present Atkinson Kansas.

The day was observed with a shot from the cannon, there being no time for further observance. Fourth of July creek and Independence creek were named in honor of the day. In the evening they fired a shot from the cannon and issued grog to the men, who drank a toast to the Stars and Stripes. Platte river mouth was passed on July 21. Progress was slow and laborious. Fierce storms assailed them, sandbars, driftwood and snags obstructed the river. One night

they had a narrow escape when the sandbar on which they were camped disintegrated beneath them. On July 30 they made camp on a high bluff overlooking the Missouri river to await a party of Indians. Three days later a group of Ojibwa and Missouri Indians arrived and, on the following day, a council was held, the pipe of peace smoked, and medals and presents were given to the chiefs. The place where the council was held was named Council Bluffs by Clark, and was about 20 miles north of present Omaha, Nebraska.

Whitworth, ace Beaverton man, showed beautiful control by fanning 12 and allowing the Paintmen only 4 bingles. The outfielders for the Merchants showed very good form by hustling up the game when the Merchants infield really needed the bolstering up.
