Lewis And Clark

The Great American Odyssey A Condensed Story of the Historic Expedition of 1804-6

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Floyd the Only Casualty Sergeant Charles Floyd died August 20 of natural causes, at a point on the river below present Sioux City, Iowa. He was buried on a high bluff with military honors, and his grave was marked with a cedar post bearing his name and date of death. Today a tall, stately obelisk marks the spot of his interment. His name was given to Floyd's river, which flows into the Missouri a short distance above the bluff where he is buried. Floyd was the only man lost on the entire trip. There was one desertion, Joe Barter, a Frenchman, called "La Liberte."

Pow-wows were held with the Indians at various points and peace pacts were made with the Sioux, Arrikaras and Mandans. Big Sioux river was reached on August 21. Two hundred miles up this stream were located the quarries where the Indians got the stone with which to make their famous red-stone pipes James river, near the present Yankton, S. D., was reached on August 27. Pryor, Dorion and another man were sent up the river to contact a village of Sioux Indians and invite them to a parley. Lewis and Clark met the Indians twenty miles farther up the Missouri, where the council was held with the usual formalities.

Big Bend of the Missouri was reached on September 20, in present South Dakota The Bend was over eighteen miles around the loop and less than a mile across the neck. Four days later they arrived at present Pierre on Bad river, where Wilson Price Hunt set out with his Astorians in 1811 on his epochal land journey to the Columbia.

On October 18, Lewis and Clark came to the mouth of a stream where there were large quantities of round stones, resembling cannon balls, so they named the stream Cannonball river. Hunting was good, the explorers living on the tenderest portions of buffalo, elk, deer and antelope. For a change they had ducks and fish. There would be lean days ahead when their mouths would water and their stomachs yearn for those delicacies.

Winter was now coming on and Lewis and Clark looked for a suitable place to make a permanent camp. The principal Mandan village was located south of present Stanton, North Dakota, below the mouth of the Knife river. A location was selected across the Missouri from the Mandan village at a wooded spot on the north bank of the river, which here flows east. On November 2 they commenced the erection of their buildings and stockade of cottonwood logs. They called it Fort Mandan. Here they spent the winter of 1804-5, about sixteen hundred miles from the mouth of the Missouri It had taken one hundred and sixty-five days to make the journey at an average of about ten miles a day.

Trading was resorted to during the winter, the Indians bartering corn and pumpkins, for iron articles made by the blacksmiths, and for other articles of trade. The two camps exchanged visits and provided entertainment for one another Christmas day, however, the Indians were excluded, being informed that this was a "Big Medicine Day" for the white men, when they wished to be alone. A grand feast was prepared and toasts were drunk to President Jefferson and other high government officials.

National Farm Safety Week, July 22-28

A day-by-day program for National Farm Safety Week, July 22-28, was announced today by the National Safety Council. Each day of the week has been designated for a specific safety activity. Sunday, the first day of the Second National Farm Safety Week, will be observed as church day. National Safety Council figures indicate that nearly 7500 farm home fatalities occur each year.

Starving Dutch Ate Bulbs Starving Dutch people ate about 500,000,000 of their valuable tulip bulbs in the last year of German occupancy. Eaters of tulip bulbs say they are filling and taste like something between an onion and an artichoke. They boiled them like potatoes, frying them when fat was available.

Dress for Sleep Two months ago, Marines trained for jungle fighting were sleeping with no cover other than a thin mosquito netting. Now their normal sleeping garb, on this temperate island includes two sets of dungarees, a sweat shirt, a woolen khaki shirt, a blanket and a poncho.

The change in temperature has another drawback. In addition to bringing chills to shivering Marines it keeps them scratching for fleas which are attracted by the warmth of their bedclothes, according to Sgt. J. P. Donahue.

The Jap drew his knife across his throat, but did not cut it. "I think I'll call his bluff" said Marine Pfc. R. Miller. He drew his combat knife and handed it to the Jap.
